## Fairfield Fire & Emergency Medical Services (EMS)

Fall 2016



**Firefighters/Paramedics are on duty around-the-clock at three locations to serve and protect residents**  
*14-15 personnel per shift*

### **Headquarters/Station #31 - 12,500 SF**

*375 Nilles Road, dedicated May 1990*

Administrative headquarters & district operations for Station #31

**Equipment** – 1) 1999 E One Quint-pumper/aerial combination 2) 2016 Horton Paramedic Ambulance 3) 2016 ALS Unit-Ford Interceptor 4) 2014 Utility/Brush Unit 5) Mobile Command Unit

### **Station #32 - 11,400 SF**

*6540 Dixie Highway, dedicated July 1999*

Two-acre site in the eastern part of the City

**Equipment** – 1) 2000 E One Quint-pumper/aerial combination 2) 1992 E One Pumper-reserve unit 3) 2010 Horton Paramedic Ambulance 4) 2002 ALS Unit-Chevy Tahoe

### **Station #33 - 10,500 SF**

*6118 Winton Road, Dedicated 1978, expanded 2002*

One-acre site in the south-central part of the City

**Equipment** – 1) 2003 E One Pumper 2) 2003 Saulsbury Heavy Rescue 3) 2013 Horton Paramedic Ambulance 4) 2004 Horton Ambulance (reserve)



### **By the numbers in 2015**

Fire Runs = 915

EMS Runs = 4,972

**Total = 5,887**

**Annual operating costs = \$5.8 million**

4.65 mill levy last passed in 2001 = \$3.8 million/year

City's General Fund = \$1.2 million\*

EMS billing = \$850,000

\*this has just been since 2013 to cover gap caused by the economic downturn, the state's elimination of the Tangible Personal Property Tax and flat revenues from EMS billing

**Additional 2.5 mill levy on fall 2016 ballot will generate approximately \$2.38 million/year**  
to provide revenue for self-sustaining operations and free up City funds for street and capital projects; increase staffing levels; restore reserve that will be insufficient at end of 2016

*First levy request in 15 years, owner of \$100,000 property will pay \$87.50/year*
