Fire Levy on May 3rd Ballot

City Council recently approved legislation to place a Fire Levy on the May 3rd ballot. This action was in response to ongoing staffing issues faced by the Fairfield Fire Department. The fire department has struggled over past several years to recruit and retain part-time employees. The department currently has eight part-time vacancies and no applicants. Most part-time employees hired come straight from local high school fire programs, have little to no practical experience and on average only stay



for 10 months before another department hires them full-time or they leave for a private sector job. Competition among local fire departments is increasing as departments such as Columbus, Cincinnati and Dayton are hiring by the hundreds and smaller departments such as Liberty Township, Fairfield Township and West Chester Township look to move away from their part-time staffing models.

To provide the necessary level of staffing, the City invested nearly \$1.4 million in overtime to fill vacant part-time positions in 2021. The amount of overtime and the costs associated with it serve only to meet the immediate needs of the department, but does not provide a long-term solution. By transitioning to a completely full-time department, the department will begin to build employee

experience and knowledge and create a more stable workforce. All firefighters would be cross-trained as paramedics, instead of EMT-Basic like the majority of current part-time employees.

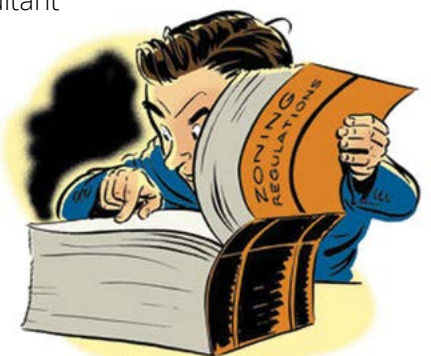
The May 3, 2022 ballot will include a 9.25 mill continuous property tax replacement levy that will provide funding dedicated to Fire Department operations. This new levy will replace the existing 7.15 mills from two continuous fire levies, one approved in 2000 for 4.65 mills and one approved in 2016 for 2.5 mills, for a total increase of 2.1 mills. The new levy will generate \$11.24 million per year, compared to the current levies generating \$6.3 million per year. This will cost an owner of a \$150,000 home \$485.63 annually, which is \$195.63 more than the current annual cost of \$290.

Planning & Zoning Code Update – Public Input

The Planning and Zoning Code is the City's primary tool to guide development throughout the community. It sets standards as to how land can be used such as placement of a building on a lot, how tall a building can be, and the type of signage that can be used to advertise a business. It also addresses the design of new subdivisions in terms of roadway layout, lot size and drainage.

Fairfield's code was adopted in 1983. While there have been numerous small updates since then, City Council decided that it was time for a comprehensive update. A consultant was hired in 2021 to assist City staff with completing this large task. Work accomplished to date has included reviewing the current code and researching surrounding community codes. Meetings with various boards, commissions, and other stakeholders to obtain feedback on what works and what needs improvement have also taken place. The consultant provided a diagnostic report detailing their findings and created a proposed outline and template for the new code, which can be reviewed at www.fairfieldzoning.com.

The consultant has moved on to the next phase of the project of beginning to draft the new code. This phase will provide opportunities for the public to comment on various sections of the code, including such topics as signs, landscaping, architectural design, and accessory structures in residential yards. In addition, stakeholder interviews will occur with targeted members of the business community. City Barbeque Coming to Fairfield

The southeast corner of Route 4 and Seward Road will soon look different as the former Gold Star Chili building is demolished and replaced with a new City Barbeque location.

Planning Commission has approved plans for the new 3,500 square-foot restaurant, which will feature a drive-thru and outdoor patio area. Construction is anticipated to be completed before the end of 2022.



City Barbeque is a fast-casual barbeque restaurant that was founded in the Columbus area in 1999. The restaurant serves beef brisket, pulled pork, turkey breast, pulled chicken, smoked sausage, and other meats and sides.

New Option for Shopping Local

Tucked away at 4952 Winton Road is a new boutique known as Of The Witches Caldron Apothecary. The shop features a variety of "natural, handmade, unique, eco-friendly, upcycled items," according to shop owner Sally Hathaway. Many of the products sold are made by local artisans from around Butler County. Products include homemade candles and beauty products, locally harvested honey, tote bags, throw pillows, and jewelry.

Hathaway, a Fairfield resident, has been selling local items on Etsy for several years and decided to open a physical storefront to better serve the Fairfield community. The shop is open on Monday, Wednesday, Friday, and weekends.

Brush Collection

Income Tax

Filing no longer required for residents who are fully retired and over the age of 65 with no taxable income!

As the Income Tax Division reviewed operations during 2021 and looked for opportunities of improvement within the division, one of the items recommended to Council were changes in income tax filing requirements as it relates to retirees within the City of Fairfield.

On January 10, 2022 Council adopted legislation adding the language as 181.091(A)(4) of the Income Tax Ordinance which exempts City of Fairfield residents who are fully retired and over the age of 65 with no taxable income from the City's mandatory filing requirement **after they file a written statement with the Tax Administrator.**

This change will be in effect with the 2021 tax year filings due on April 18, 2022. **In January, a retiree notification letter was sent to all accounts currently identified as retired taxpayers notifying them of the changes. This letter contained the form required to meet the "written statement with the Tax Administrator" requirement.**



Tall Grass? Let the City Know

Spring rains and warmer temperatures bring the start of the grass-growing season. The City of Fairfield has an ordinance requiring that the grass must be mowed to a height of less than 8 inches.

If you see a property that has tall grass and weeds, or looks like it has been abandoned, please report it to the Building & Zoning Division. For your assistance and confidentiality, the City has created a Property Maintenance Hotline at 513-867-5321 or PropertyMaintenance@FairfieldOH.gov.

During business hours, you can talk directly with an inspector. After hours, you can leave a message which will be addressed the next day.

In most cases, the property owner will remedy the issue after being contacted by the City. If the property owner does not remedy the issue in a timely manner, the City can initiate legal action that allows it to step in and address the issue.


