ANNUAL LEAF COLLECTION

Fairfield's annual leaf collection is scheduled to begin Monday, November 7, 2022. This program provides free leaf collection services to residents who place leaves in rows or piles between the curb and sidewalk or adjacent to the street in areas not having curbs and sidewalks.

Residents are advised not to place leaves in the street, as gutters and storm sewers can become blocked and cause localized flooding during moderate to heavy rainfall. Please help make the collection program run as smoothly as possible by raking your leaves between the curb and sidewalk, or in areas without curb, adjacent to the street. Also, please do not park in front of or near the piles between the hours of 7:00 a.m. and 8:00 p.m. as the trucks/equipment cannot reach them, those piles will be left until the next scheduled collection week. For the safety of our workers and the equipment, we also ask that residents not place grass clippings, sticks, or brush in with leaves.

NEW INDUSTRIAL BUILDING COMING TO BYPASS 4

Construction is underway at the intersection of Bypass 4 and Port Union Road on a new 150,000 square foot industrial building. Known as Fairfield Crossing, the project is one of several speculative industrial projects actively under construction in the Fairfield market. Prologis, a major real estate investment trust headquartered in San Francisco, is developing the new building. The project is fully market-driven and received no local incentives.



A woman-owned small business is expanding its physical footprint in Fairfield. PromoSpark, which is currently located on Hicks Boulevard, specializes in branded apparel and customized promotional products. The company is celebrating twenty years in business and has experienced steady growth in recent years.

After exploring multiple locations for an expansion, PromoSpark choose to stay in Fairfield and purchased a nearly 5 acre site at 300 Osborne Drive. Construction has commenced on a 12,000 square foot building to serve the company's office and warehousing needs. PromoSpark currently has more than a dozen employees and expects to grow that number with the new facility. ♦

DORA Launches in Fairfield Town Center

City Council authorized the creation of a Designated Outdoor Refreshment Area (DORA) in a portion of Fairfield's Town Center. Establishment of a DORA permits open container carry for beer, wine, and other intoxicating liquor



within the specified boundaries of the district. Participants need to purchase a drink in an officially designated DORA cup from a bar or restaurant located within the DORA boundaries.

FAIRFIELD DORA GUIDE TO FUN:

ORDER your favorite adult beverage in a DORA cup from a participating establishment.

DRINK within the DORA. Look for the signs; they are all around you!

EXPLORE the DORA.

DISCARD your single use cup in an appropriate trash receptacle.

REPEAT responsibly!

ENJOY the DORA 12pm - 12am daily.

Fairfield's DORA officially launched on July 14th and operates from 12:00 noon to 12:00 midnight, seven days a week. Participating establishments that sell alcohol in DORA cups include Applebee's, Berd's Grill & Bar, Fairfield Pub, La Piñata, and Richards Pizza. The Fairfield Community Arts Center will also offer DORA beverages at select events.

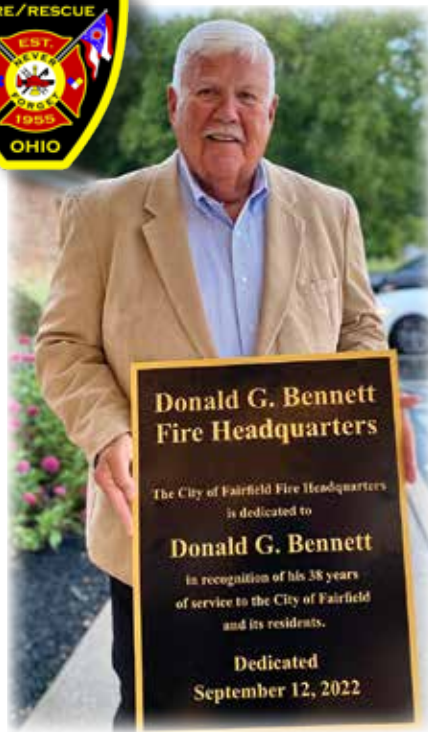
Fire Department Awarded Assistance for Firefighters Grant

On August 19, 2022, the City of Fairfield Fire Department received notification of an award from the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) for an Assistance for Firefighters Grant (AFG) that was applied for in November 2021. The AFG program is a 90/10 split between the federal government and the City that results in the federal share of the award being \$175,343.37 and the City share is \$17,534.34 for a total of \$192,877.71.

The department plans to purchase (3) Lifepak-15 cardiac monitor/defibrillators and (3) LUCAS devices which provide automated mechanical chest compressions to a patient in cardiac arrest. The Lifepak-15 cardiac monitors have the ability to acquire and transmit 3-lead and 12-lead ECGs, along with other vital signs, to area hospitals and directly into our patient care reporting system, HealthEMS. The LUCAS devices benefit the patient by ensuring chest compressions are at the right rate and depth each time.



At the completion of the project, every fire truck, ALS unit and medic unit will have advanced life support (ALS) capability. This award will benefit the citizens of Fairfield by giving our EMTs and paramedics the best tools available as they continue to provide the highest level of emergency medical services to our community.



On September 12, 2022, City Council unveiled that the fire headquarters building on Nilles Road, which Don helped build, will be named in his honor. Fairfield Fire Headquarters (Station 31) which opened in 1990, is now the Donald G. Bennett Fire Headquarters.

Fire Chief Retires After 38 Year Career

Hired on April 2, 1984 as the City's first full-time fire chief, Don Bennett has spent the last (38) years serving the citizens of Fairfield before his retirement on August 12, 2022. Chief Bennett started his career in the fire service as a volunteer with Colerain Township Fire Department in 1970 before being hired there as a career firefighter.

In his 38 years as fire chief, Chief Bennett had many accomplishments, most notably:

- Transitioned the department from an all-volunteer/paid-on-call department to an all-career department within the next 4 years based on the passage of the fire levy in May 2022.
- Designed and oversaw the building of two new firehouses (Station 31 on Nilles Road and Station 32 on Dixie Highway).
- Designed and oversaw the renovation of and addition to Station 33 on Winton Road.
- Transitioned the department to all career firefighter/paramedics, eliminating the need for a contract paramedic service that was started in the 1980s.
- Updated the entire fleet of ambulances and fire apparatus to new, more modern vehicles and established a replacement schedule to keep them updated.
- Brought the department to an ISO (Insurance Services Office) ranking of a Class 2, of which only approximately 2% of all fire departments in the United States currently hold.

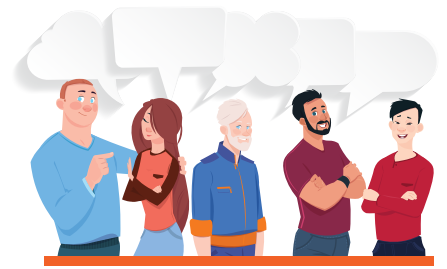

Planning & Zoning Code Update – Citizen Input

The City is in the home stretch of updating the Planning and Zoning Code. City staff, a hired consultant, and a project Advisory Committee have been diligently working to draft new code language. The current code, adopted in the early 1980s, is in need of a major overhaul and modernization. New code language has been drafted for land uses, zoning districts, accessory structures, design guidelines, overlay districts, parking, landscaping, fencing, and more. You can view and comment on these draft sections by visiting www.fairfieldzoning.com.

The Planning and Zoning Code is the City's primary tool to guide development throughout the community. It sets standards as to how land can be used such as placement of a building on a lot, how tall a building can be, and the type of signage that can be used to advertise a business.

The update will make the code more user friendly by updating existing terminology, improving the overall organization, and incorporating tables and graphics.

Smart Water Meters: Manage your water account like a pro!

As the Public Utilities Department continues to install new “smart” water meters in every home and business in Fairfield, the City encourages customers to utilize the new metering technology to be active account managers. The ‘My Water Advisor’ portal, which is linked to the City’s smart metering system, allows customers to access water account information via a web-ready device such as a computer, tablet or smartphone.

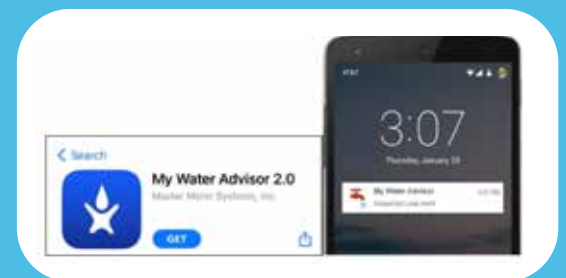
The portal provides real-time water use data, and enables customers to:

- Create monthly water budgets;
- Be alerted of possible leaks and high or unusual consumption patterns; and
- Proactively conserve water.

Utility customers can easily create an account through My Water Advisor’s online portal at <https://mywateradvisor2.com/> by following these simple steps:

1. Click on the blue ‘Join My Water Advisor’ button.
2. Once selected, a new sign up window will appear. Enter your account number and your last name as currently listed on your water bill.
3. Enter a valid email address and create a password.
4. Once registered, you can access your account by computer or smartphone using your email and password.

AT HOME

- Lock doors and close windows when you leave your house, even if it is only for a minute.
- When leaving home for an extended period of time, have a neighbor or family member watch your house, pick-up your mail or put a hold on mail. You can add your home to the police department vacation home check at the following link: <https://bit.ly/3eami1T>
- Do not post on social media that you are traveling. Never advertise an empty house.
- Indoor and outdoor lights should be on an automatic timer so it appears someone is at home. Put timers for lights in different rooms and have them come off and on at different times.
- Do not put out boxes from either large or small purchases on or before garbage day. Doing this allows others to see what new things you have in your home.
- Always do the #9PM Routine - remove valuables and firearms from your unattended vehicles. Remember to lock your car doors and keep garage doors closed.
- Do not display gifts under a tree in front of a window for passing traffic to see.
- Avoid Porch Pirates-track packages, be available for delivery, require a signature, or choose in-store pick up.

TRAVELING

- Always have an emergency safety kit in your vehicle (first aid, water, snacks, blankets, flashlight, flares, jumper cables, and cell phone charger).
- Plan your trip, know your route in case your GPS stops working and make sure someone else knows your itinerary.
- Always be aware, drive sober, have a designated driver, or rideshare. Make sure all occupants are buckled up or in car safety seats.

WHILE SHOPPING

- Stay alert to your surroundings and the people around you. Trust your instincts, If something does not feel right, its probably not, -call 9-1-1.
- Shop with a friend, there is safety in numbers.
- Avoid carrying large amounts of cash.
- Do not leave your purse/wallet in shopping carts.
- Get keys out of pocket/purse before leaving the store.
- Do not leave packages in vehicles. If changing locations, put them in the trunk BEFORE you leave one destination and get to the other. Be watchful if you observe anyone following you in the parking lot or in a vehicle once you leave the store location.
- Put all personal valuables out of sight before going to shop.
- Walk briskly, confidently, and directly through the parking lot. Do not be distracted by talking or looking at your cellphone.

Winterize Your Home and Prepare for Cold Weather

Here are a few tips to help you prepare your home for winter:



YARD

- To maintain your yard health, rake and dispose of fallen leaves.
- Remove your garden hose, drain it and store it inside. Turn off the spigot from the inside and open the outside to allow water to drain.

GUTTERS

- Late fall is also a good time to clean gutters, after leaves have fallen but before ice starts to form. This work can be dangerous, so consider hiring a handyman or lawn service company to do this work if you are uncomfortable climbing high ladders.

WINDOWS AND DOORS

- A high percentage of winter heating costs are caused by door and window leaks. Check all windows to make sure they seal tightly when closed. If there are gaps or leaks, add weather-stripping or caulk.

FIREPLACE AND CHIMNEY

- If you have a wood burning fireplace that you use often, you should schedule a chimney sweep to clean the flue and check the chimney for safety. A chimney sweep can also inspect and clean a gas fireplace.
- If you have a direct-vent type fireplace that is near the ground, you can inspect this yourself to make sure that no birds have built nests in the vent outlet.

CHECK SMOKE DETECTORS AND CONSIDER A CARBON MONOXIDE DETECTOR

- Check your smoke detectors; change the batteries and clean any dust out of the cover.
- If you have fireplaces or gas burning equipment like gas water heaters or gas furnace, a carbon monoxide detector is a great idea. These can save lives.

HEATING SYSTEM AND WATER HEATERS

- Call an HVAC professional to service your furnace and clean your duct system. Your furnace filter should be changed monthly.
- Consider a programmable thermostat. For every degree you lower your thermostat you will save 1-3% on your heating bill.
- Many conventional water heaters are set to 140 degrees by installers, but most households don't need that level. Lowering the temperature to 120 degrees may reduce your water heating costs 2-6%.

PREVENT PLUMBING FREEZES

- Help decrease the chance of pipes freezing. If your pipes are warm to the touch, they are good candidates for insulation. This can also help save money on your water bills.
- You can purchase pre-slit pipe foam at most hardware stores. Cut to size and fasten in place with duct tape. Ideally, choose the insulation with the highest R-value (measure of heat blocking power) that is practical.
- Leave your heat set at 55 degrees if you go on vacation.

PREPARE AN EMERGENCY KIT

- Store bottled water, non-perishable food (for you & pets), blankets, flashlights, candles and matches, and a first aid kit, in an easy-to-access and dry location.
