Vehicular Property Maintenance Violations

Fairfield property maintenance inspectors conduct thousands of inspections throughout the City every year. Some of the most common violations they identify involve motor vehicles which include:

Parking Violations

All vehicles (cars, trucks, trailers, etc.) must be parked on a hard surface such as concrete or asphalt. Vehicles are not allowed to park on grass.



Unlicensed/Inoperable Vehicles

Vehicles must be properly licensed with up-to-date tags. All vehicles must also be operable. Examples of inoperable vehicles include those with flat or missing tires, those with substantial damage, and those undergoing major engine repair.



NTH CYCLE INNOVATING IN FAIRFIELD

A cutting-edge company involved in electric vehicle battery manufacturing has selected Fairfield for the first location in a planned national network of metal refining operations. This new facility will be the first in the United States to recycle and refine high-purity critical metals, such as nickel and cobalt. Currently, these materials are primarily sourced overseas and manufacturers have prioritized strategies to onshore sourcing of these precious metals.

Mayor Rhodus, Councilmember Besl, and other local officials joined the company for an official commissioning of the facility this summer. The 21,000 square foot facility is located on Le Saint Drive. Once fully operational, the business will employ a highly-skilled workforce and partner with surrounding industries to source materials.



Demolition Set for Seward Road Building

The former Liberty Mutual office building at 9450 Seward Road has been acquired by Koch Foods. The company plans to demolish the building to prepare the site for new development. At more than 200,000 square feet, demolition of the structure is a major undertaking.

The building was originally constructed in 1974 as a warehouse for McAlpin's Department Stores, which became a division of Mercantile Stores. Mercantile renovated the building into its headquarters in 1990 and subsequently sold the campus to Ohio Casualty Insurance in 1998. Liberty Mutual Insurance purchased Ohio Casualty in 2007 and occupied the building until 2020 when the company implemented a work-from-home model that required less office space.

After acquiring the site from Liberty Mutual, Ambrose Property Group of Indianapolis has led development of vacant land surrounding the former office building. This property is now home to Fairfield Commerce Park, a fully-leased Class A business park boasting more than 1.4 million square feet of industrial space.



Cincinnati Financial Earns Energy Designation

Fairfield-based Cincinnati Financial Corporation, parent company of The Cincinnati Insurance Companies, recently received Energy Star certification for its office campus on South Gilmore Road. Cincinnati Financial Corporation's headquarters is the largest building in Greater Cincinnati to earn this designation. Energy Star certification, a program of the U.S. EPA, represents verified superior energy performance over a 12-month period. Energy Star certified buildings cause 35 percent fewer greenhouse gas emissions than typical buildings.



Scooter's Coming Soon!

Scooter's Coffee has begun construction on a new location at the corner of Route 4 and Magie Avenue. The location will be within the parking lot of the Cornerstone Shopping Center.

Scooter's is a rapidly growing coffee franchise based in Nebraska. There are 400 locations in 23 states nationally, with several dozen locations planned in Ohio. The nearest current location is in Batesville, Indiana.



Fairfield Fire Department News



Over the past few months the Fairfield Fire Department has been experiencing several exciting changes! On June 16, 2023, Captain Jim Howell retired from the Department after serving the City for over 38 years! Captain Howell was one of the first full-time Fire Captains hired in 1993 and served as a volunteer and part-time firefighter since 1984. Captain Howell will be enjoying his well-deserved retirement with his wife Shirley and their granddaughter Lilly!

Promotions

The department has promoted two Deputy Fire Chiefs, one Fire Captain and two Fire Lieutenants. Deputy Chiefs Chad Cooper and Steve Conn were promoted on July 10, 2023. Deputy Chief Cooper has been with the Fairfield Fire Department for 22 years and has served as a Fire Lieutenant for the past 16 years. Deputy Chief Conn served the Colerain Township Fire Department for 30 years working the past eight years as a Battalion Chief.

Lieutenant Dan Korte was promoted to Fire Captain on June 19, 2023. Captain Korte has been with the Fairfield Fire Department since 2007 serving the past five years as a Fire Lieutenant. Firefighters Matthew Hicks and Jeremy Shiflett were promoted to Fire Lieutenant on June 19, 2023. Lieutenant Hicks has 11 years in the fire service and five years with the City of Fairfield. Lieutenant Shiflett has 14 years' experience in the fire service and 12 years with the City of Fairfield.

Events for the week should include testing your smoke detectors to ensure they work, having a meeting place away from the home if there is a fire and making a home escape plan that meets the needs of all the members of the household. The Fire Department will also be conducting the annual fire prevention poster contest with the local schools.

A job well done



At the May 22, 2023 Fairfield City Council Meeting, employees and patrons of the Lane Public Library were recognized for their heroic efforts to save the life of a library customer.

On Monday, March 20, 2023, the patient suffered a cardiac arrest in the Fairfield Lane Public Library. Within seconds, the patrons and staff of the library sprang into action. Conner Lewis witnessed the patient collapse and alerted the library staff. Two employees of the Library, Valerie Simmons and Hanna Reisenberg began CPR and placed an AED on the patient while another employee (Emma Darby) called 911.

Prior to fire department arrival, a Nurse Practitioner, Audrey Reese Pipkin was assisting the employees with CPR and AED instructions. They shocked the patient with the AED two times and continued CPR.

Upon the fire department's arrival, the patient was still unconscious however now had a pulse. Excellent pre-hospital care was provided to the patient by the paramedics of the Fairfield Fire Department and was transported to the hospital.

The patient fully recovered and was discharged from the hospital without deficit.

Coyotes in Fairfield

Typically, coyotes are thought of as being part of the southwest landscape or chasing our favorite road runner; however, they have been living in Ohio for approximately 100 years. Coyotes are highly intelligent, adaptable and have found a way to live in rural, suburban, and urban areas in all states except Hawaii. The key to coexisting with wildlife like coyotes is to understand the animal and our interactions with them.



Understanding the Coyote

Coyotes are members of the canine family so learning to identify them is important. A coyote is between 25 and 35 pounds with thick fur causing them to appear much larger. They range in color from a gray-brown to a gray-yellow and may have flecks of reddish brown along their muzzle and legs. They are smaller than a typical labrador retriever and larger than a fox. They have pointed ears, a long pointed muzzle, and amber colored eyes. The most distinguishing characteristic is their black-tipped tail.

In urban and suburban areas, coyotes have created their territory or dens in places with plenty of cover with access to food and water. They can typically be found in large parks, golf courses, and natural open space near a water source.


Coyotes are a natural pest control entity in our City. They are predators of geese, wild turkeys, squirrels, mice, rabbits, rats, woodchucks, and other small animals. Rodents and roadkill likely make for the majority of their diet. Suburban and urban areas provide coyotes with new food sources not typically seen in the wild such as bird and squirrel feeders, pet food, compost piles, and trash. Homes with accessory structures and overgrowth may provide adequate shelter as coyotes hunt or den. Though an interaction with a coyote may elicit fear, the animals are naturally afraid of humans. To safely coexist, it is imperative that we are attentive to coyote attractants within the City as well as proper “fear conditioning” to the animal.

Coyote Management

The City's strategy for managing coyotes is based on balancing respect and protection for wildlife and their habitats without compromising public safety. This follows the United States Department of Agriculture's recommendation of an integrated wildlife damage management. This approach involves actions from four main categories: habitat management, cultural practices, animal behavioral management, and wildlife population management. The intersection of these categories creates the sweet spot for coexistence with wildlife.

The graphic below lists quick and easy adjustments to make to safeguard your home. In addition, education plays a key role in coyote and human coexistence. The City has brought in two wildlife experts—Brett Beatty, Wildlife Management Supervisor with the Ohio Division of Wildlife and Tommy Butler, Assistant District Supervisor with the USDA—to talk with residents about coyotes and ways to keep everyone safe. On November 13, 2023, Lane Public Library will be hosting Barbara Ray, the Nature Education Coordinator from the City of Dublin to further teach residents about coyote behavior and give us all important tips and tools we need to safely coexist.

Ways to Live with Wildlife

Reducing Attractants

- Secure all compost and trash bins.
- Remove or clean up around bird feeders that may attract small mammals.
- Clean up fallen fruit around trees.
- Clean up food around grills after each use.

Environmental Controls

- Trim vegetation to reduce potential hiding places and denning sites.
- Restrict access under decks and sheds; around woodpiles, or other structures that can provide cover.
- Install lights to reduce dark areas of yard.

Pet Safety

- Never leave a pet unattended outside even in fenced yards.
- Walk pets on a leash no longer than 6 feet in length.
- Fully enclose outdoor kennels.
- Avoid feeding pets outside; remove sources of pet food and water.

DEFINING FAIRFIELD'S NEIGHBORHOODS

Neighborhood is used to describe an area surrounding a local institution patronized by residents, such as a church, school, or social agency. It can also be defined by a political ward or precinct. The concept of neighborhood includes both physical (place-oriented) and social (people-oriented) components.

Providing defined boundaries allows organic and governmental interventions to target the needs of the residents in that particular community. Neighborhoods have been proven to elicit a sense of pride and higher levels of engagement.




Neighborhoods can reduce crime. (Think of crime watches and community policing programs.)

Neighborhoods can improve health. Researchers have learned that people who have strong support networks are not only healthier, they literally live longer.

Neighborhoods can produce better outcomes for children. If "it takes a village to raise a child," the neighborhood is a modern-day village equivalent.

Neighborhoods can stimulate local economic development. Neighborhood residents expand the available social contacts for local businesses. The simple principle is that the more contacts you have, the more likely you will know someone who can help, get you what you need, or who knows someone who can.

Fourteen neighborhood boundaries are proposed for Fairfield utilizing principles from more than 50 years of research and benchmarking from major cities.



Though research and benchmarking can guide the lines on a map, neighborhoods should reflect what residents themselves view as their neighborhood. Therefore, the Neighborhood Development Manager will be coordinating public feedback sessions in neighborhoods, at local churches, and popular events. To build on the success of the founders of Fairfield, the City needs the resident's engagement and feedback. Energy Aggregation Issues to Appear on November 7 Ballot in Fairfield – Here's What You Need to Know!

Fairfield City Council has decided to place energy aggregation issues on the November 7, 2023 ballot. Two separate issues will be placed on the ballot: one for natural gas and one for electric. If these issues pass, the City of Fairfield will register to become a certified aggregator with the Public Utilities Commission of Ohio (PUCO). This will allow city officials to negotiate utility rates for the electric and natural gas use for residents and small businesses that use Duke Energy Ohio.

City Council is committed to finding ways to stabilize utility costs for residents. Energy aggregation is a tool that local governments can use to give residents another option for the purchase of energy.

What is an Energy Aggregation Program?

Community electric and natural gas aggregation programs combine the residential and small business purchasing power of a larger “aggregated” group in pursuit of lowering and stabilizing energy prices.

Why are these Issues on the November 7 Ballot?

Electric and natural gas aggregation issues appear on the ballot by law. Voters must approve these issues prior to implementation of any program.

What does my YES vote mean?

A YES vote will allow City Council to complete the certification process through the Public Utilities Commission of Ohio (PUCO) and start the process to determine if electric and natural gas aggregation programs are a beneficial option to residents and small businesses.

What does a NO vote do?

A NO vote will not allow the City Council to explore the option of energy aggregation.

Will I save money on my utility bill?

The programs are designed to stabilize energy prices and save money. They provide security against volatile energy markets. Savings is always a priority but cannot be guaranteed. In most cases, residents will see a reduction in energy costs.

Will I have a separate bill?

No. You'll continue to get a single bill from Duke Energy.

If this passes, am I required to be in the program?

No, you will be able to participate if you wish, but can enter or leave the program at any time without any fees.

My electric is with Butler Rural Electric Cooperative, can I participate in the program?

No, only Ohio customers with an investor-owned utility (i.e. Duke Energy) are allowed to shop their electric rates.
