Who Needs to File:

- Residents between the ages of 18-65 (including part-year residents)
- Residents 65 years or older with taxable income.
- Businesses doing business in Fairfield.
- Employees working in Fairfield whose employer failed to fully withhold Fairfield taxes.
- Non-residents with income or losses from self-employment and/or rental property earned within the City limits.

When to File:

- Individuals and Business Net-Profit (excluding fiscal year filers) due **April 15, 2024**.
- Employer reconciliations due **February 29, 2024**.
- Please visit our website for details on extensions for time to file your return.

What is Needed to File:

- Federal 1040 with any applicable schedules.
- W-2(s)
- Any additional supporting documentation.

Business Net-Profit Returns

- Completed business return.
- Federal Tax Return.

EMERGENCY VEHICLE PREEMPTION (EVP) SYSTEM

Many traffic signals throughout the United States have a small light that is placed between or off to the side of the traffic signal lights. Sometimes you see them change when emergency vehicles are passing through.

These are for emergency vehicle preemption of the traffic signals. The confirmation lights are part of a system that allows the operator of a vehicle to override the normal operation of a traffic light. In the City of Fairfield, the confirmation lights are eight inch diameter, white LED's and they are at every traffic signal in the City.

In Fairfield, as in most jurisdictions, if the light is steady that means the signal has been preempted and will give a green light for a signal in that direction. However, if the light is flashing, it means that the signal has been preempted to give the green light in a different direction.

Emergency Vehicle Preemption (EVP) systems are installed in order to reduce emergency vehicle response by allowing emergency vehicles to get to scenes faster and clear a path for the vehicle. It can also improve safety by giving a red light to all other lights at the intersection so no traffic impedes an emergency vehicle.

EVP systems were first installed in the early 1980s in the United States. There are several different systems including radio, GPS, emitter based, etc. The City of Fairfield uses an audible based system. The reasoning for the audible based system is that it allows all of our neighboring jurisdictions to be able to use the system when responding to an emergency.

Our Fire Department and Police Department report any issues they may have to our Public Works Department in order for repairs to be made. The Public Works Department also has these systems tested regularly as part of our regular signal maintenance procedures.



Introducing the Fairfield Police Department Special Needs Registry

Emergencies can happen at a moment's notice. Mobility, learning, developmental and other physical disabilities can create specific needs that individuals must address to be able to respond to an emergency.

Many communities ask people with a special need, severe medical condition, or special circumstance to register with the local fire or police department or emergency management office, so help can be provided quickly in an emergency. The City of Fairfield Police Department is launching a similar voluntary special needs checklist. This list is a tool that enables emergency responders to prioritize their response during emergency situations. To be fully inclusive, the City of Fairfield proactively decided to collaborate with its residents to ensure the highest level of service and safety. The checklist requests information to serve the residents who are vulnerable, at risk, or with a physical, intellectual, or development disability. In emergency situations, keeping everyone safe and calm is paramount. With this list, dispatchers can alert first responders to any special needs that may be onsite. The Fairfield Police Department's voluntary registration is open to all citizens with special needs who reside, attend school, or are employed in the City of Fairfield.

Information about the SNR registrant shall be kept strictly confidential.

Other municipalities who have instituted a voluntary special needs checklist have been able to strategically train public safety and better plan for large scale disasters across the entire city. Major Ervin said, "Inclusive practices that prioritize the safety and well-being of all residents, regardless of age or ability, are essential in ensuring effective emergency preparedness and response. Solar Energy Systems For Your Home

Solar energy is sustainable, renewable, and plentiful. As the cost of installing solar energy systems goes down each year, people around the United States, including many in Fairfield, are increasingly adding solar panels to supplement the energy options for their homes.

Adding solar energy systems to your house can provide numerous benefits, including:

Cost Savings – Solar energy systems provide an opportunity to significantly reduce monthly utility bills. Over the long term, the monthly savings will greatly outweigh the initial installation cost.

Increased Property Value – Numerous studies show that solar energy systems increase property values. Solar systems are viewed as home upgrades, like a renovated kitchen or a finished basement.

Environmental Benefits – Each kilowatt-hour (kWh) of solar energy that is generated will substantially reduce greenhouse gas emissions like CO₂, as well as other dangerous pollutants such as sulfur oxides, nitrogen oxides and particulate matter. Solar also reduces water consumption and withdrawal.

There are different types of solar energy systems, each with different pros and cons, so if you are considering one be sure to consult with a qualified solar company and ask many questions to ensure you get the system that best fits your needs.

Installing a solar energy system requires building permits and inspections from the City of Fairfield Building Division. These systems are significant construction projects that typically require review of building structural support elements, rooftop installation, battery storage units, and substantial electrical work. For your safety

and protection, anyone considering adding a new solar energy system should use a qualified installer and make sure all required permits and inspections are secured.



Hefty ReNew Program

Rumpke Waste & Recycling and Hefty's ReNew program have partnered to allow people to recycle hard-to-recycle plastics. The program will be able to divert more waste from landfills. Residents can request a free starter kit at bit.ly/3Fb9YZx and purchase more bags at their local Kroger store or online at Kroger. Each orange bag features a list of hard-to-recycle items that can be collected in the bag for recycling. The ReNew program will not replace current recycling habits and routines. Recycling customers should continue to place paper, cardboard, cartons, glass and plastic bottles, tubs, cups and aluminum and steel cans in their Rumpke bins loose and un-bagged. The new orange bags, once filled, can be placed in a Rumpke Recycling bin or public recycling drop box for collection.

Grant Awards to Jumpstart Two Critical Neighborhood Connectivity Projects

Fairfield was recently awarded nearly \$2.5 million in Federal transportation grant funding to support two priority shared use projects within the City's neighborhoods. The funding was competitively awarded by the Ohio-Kentucky-Indiana Regional Council of Governments (OKI) as part of a \$50.4 million package of transportation projects within the region.

The two projects include:

1 Great Miami River Trail Extension

OKI approved funding in the amount of \$750,306 towards extension of the Great Miami River Trail (GMRT) from its current terminus at Waterworks Park to connect with the existing trail segment within Marsh Park. This extension, to be constructed in 2027, will bring the trail south to the roundabout at River and Gray Roads, facilitating future expansion to the Furfield Dog Park.

The GMRT is a regional multi-use trail envisioned to extend from Hamilton County north to Shelby County. Neighboring jurisdictions have secured funding to close the remaining trail gaps between Hamilton and Middletown, connecting more than 80 miles of unbroken trail. Unlike many sections of the GMRT that follow the Great Miami River, Fairfield's segment will be unique in that it will move away from the river, providing stunning views of Marsh Lake and improved connections to the surrounding neighborhoods.

2 Pleasant Avenue Shared Use Path

OKI approved funding in the amount of \$1,738,290 towards construction of a shared use path on the west side of Pleasant Avenue/ US 127 between Hunter Road and Wessel Drive. This project, to be constructed in 2027, will create a separated shared use path in coordination with traffic calming improvements planned for the corridor.

The new path will connect to the Fairfield Town Center area, providing residents with the option to walk or bike to reach local restaurants, retail stores, Village Green Park, and the DORA district. On the south end, the path will end at Hunter Road, which provides a direct connection to Harbin Park.

Both projects were identified as priorities in the Fairfield Connects plan, a connectivity master plan adopted by Fairfield City Council to identify opportunities to improve the walkability and bikeability of the City and its neighborhoods. Now that OKI has approved funding for both projects, the City will advance engineering and detailed design in preparation for construction.

Thank You Public Works Crew!

One of the many services that the City of Fairfield offers is our residential leaf pick up program. The Public Works Department operates this program every fall. The mechanics on staff will service all four of our leaf machines as well as the four trucks that are used to pull the leaf machines and haul the leaves. The Street Division crews will go out to a few neighborhoods in late October to make sure all of the equipment is functioning properly and ready for use. The program starts the first full week of November and the crews will sweep the City working from west to east for two months making sure to go by every residential home at least three times (often more).

The Public Works crew will spend 2000-3000 hours in a given fall in order to get this work done, often working from daylight to dark and on Saturdays during the busiest weeks. Our crews spend even more hours on leaves than we do on snow and ice, though we average nearly 2000 hours per winter on that seasonal operation. That doesn't include all the training and prep work for up to twenty-two vehicles used for snow operations. Every leaf season is different with the weather sometimes being too hot, sometimes too cold, sometimes too wet, and surprisingly it can be too dry. Regardless of the conditions, the dedicated crew will pick up an average of 5000 cubic yards of leaves every autumn. The weight and volume can vary greatly depending on precipitation during the leaf season; it can be over 1500 tons of leaves, or enough to fill a 50-pound trash can nearly 60,000 times.

100% of these leaves (as well as all material from our brush collection and brush-box program) is diverted from the landfill. Brush materials are ground up and used in commercial mulch. The leaf material is either included in mulch making or used to add nutrients to the soil on agricultural land.

The support shown to our crews during the fall and winter months from the community is appreciated by all of those who work to provide this service to our residents.

Smart Water Meters: Manage your water account like a pro!

As the Public Utilities Department recently installed new "smart" water meters in every home and business in Fairfield, the City encourages customers to utilize the new metering technology to be active account managers. The 'My Water Advisor' portal, which is linked to the City's smart metering system, allows customers to access water account information via a web-ready device such as a computer, tablet or smartphone. The portal provides real-time water use data, and enables customers to:

- Create monthly water budgets;
- Be alerted of possible leaks and high or unusual consumption patterns; and
- Proactively conserve water.

Utility customers can easily create an account through My Water Advisor's online portal at <https://mywateradvisor2.com/> by following these simple steps:

1. Click on the blue 'Join My Water Advisor' button.
2. Once selected, a new sign up window will appear. Enter your account number as listed on your water bill and then your first and last name.
3. Enter a valid email address and create a password.
4. Once registered, you can access your account by computer or smartphone using your email and password.

Customers can also download the free smartphone app from Apple App store and Google Play store: search for **My Water Advisor 2.0**.
