FAIRFIELD SUSTAINS

In September, Fairfield City Council adopted the City's first-ever sustainability plan, called *Fairfield Sustains*. This action plan was developed to ensure that the City is utilizing resources in a way that provides efficiency in municipal operations now and in the future. The plan will serve as a comprehensive roadmap for addressing environmental, economic, and livability considerations and will be a catalyst for quality-of-life improvements for all Fairfield residents.



Over the past decades, Fairfield has made significant strides towards becoming a more sustainable community. Sustainability is embedded in many aspects of municipal operations and community planning, in areas including but not limited to residential recycling and yard-waste collection programs, drinking water protection, community electric and natural gas aggregation, renewable energy procurement for municipal facilities, and open space and parks preservation.

Fairfield Sustains both acknowledges this foundational work and offers a renewed commitment to the continuation of these practices as a key driver to the overall quality of life for Fairfield's residents, businesses, and visitors.

- 2. Mobility and transportation**
- 3. Resource conservation**
- 4. Nature and green community**
- 5. Community and business resilience**

REMODELED GOODWILL STORE REOPENS

Goodwill's recent grand reopening of the Fairfield Crossing Goodwill store represents a significant step forward in supporting individuals with barriers to employment.

The remodeled store now includes the region's first *Goodwill Opportunity Center*, which provides essential job training and pre-vocational skills to individuals seeking work. This initiative addresses local workforce needs by offering hands-on training and connecting individuals with vital community resources, such as housing and food assistance.

The new facility not only enhances the shopping experience but also reinforces Goodwill's mission to support those facing employment challenges, including individuals with disabilities and military veterans. By generating funds through retail sales, Goodwill continues to invest in programs that promote economic independence and personal growth. The expanded services underscore a broader commitment to community development, helping residents prepare for meaningful job opportunities and improving their overall quality of life.



PNDE Begins Expansion Project



Professional NDE Services Group (PNDE), a provider of non-destructive

exploration services for industrial applications, is celebrating its fifth year of operation in Fairfield. Serving industries such as aerospace, automotive, chemical, and manufacturing, the company currently operates from a 10,000 square foot facility at 3975 Port Union Road, which includes both corporate offices and an on-site laboratory.

To accommodate significant growth and an expanding customer base, PNDE has begun the expansion of the building by 13,000 square feet, more than doubling the size of its lab. With 26 associates on staff, the company expects to increase its workforce to over 30 once the expansion is complete.



Underdog's Brings Unique Taste to Fairfield

Fairfield's first brewery, Swine City Brewing, has officially debuted a distinctive hot dog stand within its walls called *Underdog's Almost Famous Wieners*. This new concept features a creative menu of gourmet hot dogs, including options like the *Donut Dog* served in a glazed croissant from Jupiter Coffee & Donuts and the *Ohio Dog* topped with Cincinnati chili and cheese. The hot dog stand operates out of the brewery's kitchen.

The introduction of *Underdog's Almost Famous Wieners* represents a novel dining option for Fairfield, blending local collaborations with inventive flavors. The stand hosts monthly specials on "Wiener Wednesday," showcasing new hot dog creations. This addition reflects a fresh, creative approach to the local food scene.

Skyline Chili, headquartered on Thunderbird Drive in Fairfield, has been named the No. 1 regional fast-food chain in USA TODAY's 10 Best Readers' Choice Awards. Founded in 1949 by Greek immigrant Nicholas Lambrinides, Skyline has become a beloved fixture in Southwestern Ohio culture, with over 150 locations across Ohio, Kentucky, Indiana, and Florida. Known for its unique chili topped with cheddar cheese and served over spaghetti, Skyline's iconic dish is a symbol of the Greater Cincinnati region.

Fairfield Municipal Court

Dear Fellow Fairfield Residents,

I want to thank you for the honor and privilege of serving as the Fairfield Municipal Court Judge since June 1999 and share that I have given notice to Governor DeWine and Chief Justice Kennedy of my intent to retire as of October 31, 2024. I will be forever grateful for you placing your trust in me to dispense justice and uphold the values of our community.

In my capacity as the Fairfield Municipal Court Judge, in 2000 I took the initiative to develop and establish one of the first municipal court mental health dockets in the State of Ohio. This program diverts individuals from criminal convictions and/or incarceration when their involvement with the criminal justice system is the result of a mental health condition.

Additionally, as a result of the success of the Mental Health Docket, an OVI (Operating a Vehicle Under the Influence) docket was established in 2008. This program gives multiple OVI offenders an opportunity to obtain treatment and commence on a path to recovery from addiction and substance abuse.

Both specialized dockets have been continuously certified by the Ohio Supreme Court. I have spent my entire judicial career working to educate, support and advocate for those with a mental health and/or substance use condition that become involved with the criminal justice system. These specialized dockets assist participants in obtaining the assistance they need to become productive citizens, saves taxpayer dollars and protects our community. It is my sincere desire that my successor continues these life-saving dockets.

As your elected Judge I have been afforded the opportunity to serve on many boards of directors, commissions and taskforces to improve the judicial system including the Attorney General's Taskforce on Criminal Justice and Mental Illness since its inception, the Ohio Supreme Court Commission on Specialized Dockets, the Ohio Judicial College Board of Trustees and the Ohio Supreme Court Commission on the Rules of Superintendence. Additionally, I have served as President of the Association of Municipal Court/County Court Judges and Chair of the Ohio Judicial Conference (representing all the judges of Ohio). My participation in these activities not only served to improve the justice system but enhanced my skills and expertise to better serve my community.

In addition to my judicial duties, I serve on the Butler County Mental Health and Addiction Services Board of Directors, as a member and past President of the NAMI Ohio Board of Directors and member and Immediate Past President of the NAMI National Board of Directors. I previously served on the Ohio Suicide Prevention Foundation and the NAMI Butler County Board of Directors. As a result of my experience as a Specialized Docket Judge and my work with NAMI at the local, state and national level and other organizations I am going to devote more time to expanding my advocacy and educational work in the mental health/substance abuse space on a national and international level.

Although I will not be presiding over a docket every day at the Fairfield Municipal Court I intend to remain an active member of the Fairfield community. I want to express my heartfelt thanks the City Manager, City Council Members, Department Heads, and most importantly, my dedicated and hardworking court staff for this incredible 25-year journey. It has been a pleasure to serve my fellow citizens, and I am grateful for the sustained support.

FAIRFIELD FIRE DEPARTMENT NEWS

Train, Prepare, Serve



Fairfield Fire Department has been busy preparing for challenging fire scenarios BEFORE they take place in our community. While much of firefighting can be reactionary, we must train and practice how to effectively respond in an efficient manner, BEFORE an emergency takes place.

This Fall, all Fairfield Fire personnel had the opportunity to train alongside mutual aid partners- City of Hamilton Fire Department and Fairfield Township Fire Department. These training opportunities not only help build and sharpen essential firefighting skills, but also build working relationships with mutual aid partners that will be invaluable when a mutual aid call inevitably arises.

Fairfield Fire crews were grateful to utilize the vacant Pearl's Diner building to practice skills and techniques over the course of four weeks- including flowing water, roof ventilation practices, and advanced rescue techniques.



Additionally, FFD crews focused on fire victim rescue and removal from a series of challenging scenarios, such as accessing interior spaces through a window, locating a victim in large "open" areas, and techniques for dragging victims in a variety of conditions. With this training under our belt, FFD crews feel even more equipped and ready to respond to the needs of Fairfield residents and the needs of residents in neighboring communities.

Holiday Fire Safety

Between an increase in holiday cooking, potential decoration dangers, and unsafe heating practices - winter is a top season for home fires. Protect your family and keep this season jolly with some very simple and practical safety tips.

When preparing your Thanksgiving turkey, never attempt to deep fry a fully-frozen turkey! Frozen turkeys plunged into hot oil can cause a large and consuming fire that can quickly get out of control. Be sure to thaw your turkey before frying and keep your deep fryer a safe distance away from your house, off wooden decking, in case of fire. While preparing side dishes or an oven-baked turkey, never leave food on the stove or in the oven unattended.

We know you want to stay "Merry and Bright," but holiday decorations can pose fire hazards if unsafely implemented. If your family celebrates with a real evergreen Christmas tree, be sure to water the tree regularly to prevent it from drying out. When a real tree dries out, it is important to safely dispose of it quickly, as a dry tree is highly flammable.



Whether using a real or artificial tree, it is important to be sure not to overload electrical outlets with lights and other decorations to avoid sparking an electrical fire. Always remember to turn off or unplug decorations when you leave home or go to sleep for the night. Additionally, if decorating with candles, never leave an open flame unattended, or within reach of small children or animals.

Stay Warm, Stay Safe

As cold winter weather inevitably blows in, be prepared to keep warm and stay safe! While space heaters are popular for homes and office areas, remember to only utilize space heaters with a safety setting that allows the device to shut off, if knocked over. Additionally, space heaters should be plugged directly into a wall outlet (not a power strip) and should be turned off whenever you leave the room. Remember to keep space heaters out of reach of small children and animals and away from any debris or furniture that can burn.

Fireplaces are a cozy way to help heat your home - and can be especially helpful during power outages - however, they must be properly maintained and secured.. Before utilizing your fireplace, be sure it is clean and has been inspected recently for safe use. Fireplace heat screens are helpful tools to keep ashes and embers in and children and small animals out!

As a reminder, NEVER use your oven or stove to heat your home and ensure all smoke alarms and carbon monoxide detectors are in proper working order.

Public Works professionals are often first on the scene and the last to leave the scenes of disasters - no matter the peril - providing vital support for emergency partners, helping protect essential services and infrastructure.
- ◆ The National Incident Management System (NIMS) lists Public Works alongside Police, Fire, and Public Health in its documentation: National Incident Management System, 3rd Edition (fema.gov).

Furniture Disposal

From time to time, everyone has a need to get rid of old or unwanted furniture. Small items are generally easy to deal with, but larger pieces of furniture can be more difficult. Fortunately, Fairfield residents have several options to dispose of these larger items.

If the pieces are in good shape, you can consider selling them (yard sale or online) or donating them to a charitable organization. There are also haul-away services that will come to your home to remove items, generally for a fee.

Rumpke, the City's contracted curbside garbage removal company, also can remove larger items if the proper steps are followed.

1. All upholstered, cloth, vinyl or leather-covered furniture pieces or mattresses/box springs must be completely wrapped in plastic before Rumpke drivers will take them. The purpose of the plastic wrap is to limit the spread of insects like bed bugs. Wood or plastic items do not need to be wrapped in plastic.
2. It is required that you notify Rumpke at least 48 hours before you place these items out with your regular garbage and recycling, as they often are too large for the standard truck to accommodate. You can contact Rumpke to schedule this at: <https://www.rumpke.com/contact-us/request-service> or 513-742-2900.
3. Place the items at the curb the evening before your scheduled pick-up day. It is a violation of City ordinances to put any items out earlier. If proper procedures are not followed and the items are not able to be picked up, owners should promptly remove the items from the curb and put them back in their house or garage. It is an unsanitary nuisance to the neighborhood to leave the items at the curb for days and weeks.





ANNUAL LEAF COLLECTION

Fairfield's annual leaf collection is scheduled to begin Monday, November 4, 2024. This program provides free leaf collection services to residents who place leaves in rows or piles between the curb and sidewalk or adjacent to the street in areas not having curbs and sidewalks.

Residents are advised not to place leaves in the street, as gutters and storm sewers can become blocked and cause localized flooding during moderate to heavy rainfall. Please help make the collection program run as smoothly as possible by raking your leaves between the curb and sidewalk, or in areas without curb, adjacent to the street. Also, please do not park in front of or near the piles between the hours of 7:00 a.m. and 8:00 p.m. as the trucks/equipment cannot reach them, those piles will be left until the next scheduled collection week. For the safety of our workers and the equipment, we also ask that residents not place grass clippings, sticks, or brush in with leaves.

STREETS WEST OF PLEASANT AVENUE:

STREETS BETWEEN PLEASANT AVENUE AND WINTON ROAD:

STREETS EAST OF WINTON ROAD:

November 18 thru November 22
December 9 thru December 13
December 30 thru January 3

Depending on weather and volume of leaves, crews may run a little bit behind schedule from time to time, but please have leaves raked to the curbside by the posted dates.

Residents who have a small amount of leaves, or who do not wish to participate in the program, may find it more convenient to bag their leaves and place them curbside for pick-up on the regular trash collection day.
