KEEP YOUR SIDEWALKS CLEAR

Have you recently been out enjoying a walk in your neighborhood when you encountered a sidewalk blocked by low hanging tree branches or overgrown shrubs? Have you stumbled over a large clump of grass growing in a sidewalk crack? Is a car parked over the sidewalk nearly every evening? If so, please report these obstacles to the City's Zoning Division.

Fairfield Codified Ordinances require that vegetation be maintained to provide unimpeded pedestrian access on public sidewalks. Trees and shrubs should be trimmed to provide at least six feet of clearance above the sidewalk.

Sidewalks should be edged regularly and grass in any cracks should be trimmed or sprayed so a clear and passable path is always maintained. This is particularly important for residents in wheelchairs, those pushing baby strollers, or kids riding bicycles.

Additionally, cars parked in driveways cannot block a public sidewalk. Occasionally, people have guests over and may need additional parking.

This should not be a regular occurrence, however, since it blocks the public right-of-way.

Southern Champion Tray Collaborates with Neighbor

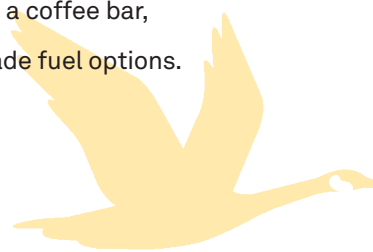

Annual Fairfield Career Fest Held

For the fourth consecutive year, Fairfield Career Fest hosted nearly 1,400 juniors and seniors at Fairfield High School to explore career opportunities in the Fairfield area. Approximately 50 local businesses, educational providers, and workforce organizations packed the high school arena to engage with students about both near-term and long-term job opportunities in manufacturing, health-care, financial services, and many other fields. Public service careers at the City of Fairfield, including police and fire career paths, were also highlighted.

Help Protect Your Water Supply!

Backflow is the undesired reversal of water flow, most often caused by pressure changes inside your home or in the pipes which deliver water to your home. If backflow occurs, contaminants could be pulled into your home's plumbing and public water mains, jeopardizing the quality of your water and others' water. To help prevent backflow at your home, adhere to the following:

- If you operate an irrigation sprinkler system, be sure the system is equipped with an approved backflow preventer device. Have the device tested annually by a certified plumber. Properly winterize your sprinkler system each fall and have all lines blown out to prevent against freezing.
- Don't submerge garden hoses in any liquid. When filling a swimming pool or even a 5-gallon bucket with a garden hose, maintain an "air gap" between the hose and the pool or bucket.
- Be mindful of what you connect to your garden hose. If you connect your garden hose to such things as hand-held fertilizer or weed-killer applicators, you risk those substances being sucked back into the hose (and possibly into your home or public water mains).
- To protect against back-siphonage, make sure all of your hose bibbs have vacuum breakers. Your hose bibb may already have an integral vacuum breaker; the breaker often looks like a small "mushroom" cap on the top of the bibb. If not, an inexpensive hose-connection vacuum breaker can be purchased separately and screwed directly onto the bibb.
- If you have an older toilet, ensure it has an anti-siphon fill valve/ballcock.

City of Fairfield Residential Tree Program

Let's work together to maintain Fairfield as a great
"Tree City" with a thriving urban forest.

The Residential Tree Program provides the City's homeowners with a 50% co-pay, up to \$200, for a tree purchased from Meyer's Garden Center & Landscaping or by Lakeview Garden Center & Landscaping.

GUIDELINES

- Tree must be purchased from Meyer's Garden Center & Landscaping (5072 Dixie Hwy) or by Lakeview Garden Center & Landscaping (6061 Pleasant Ave)
- Tree must be planted on the resident's property or (if approved by the City) in the public right-of-way.
- An approved application is required prior to purchase to ensure that funds are available.
- Each property owner may request one tree per year.
- Program runs from April 1 through November 1

Energy Aggregation Update

Response to Increasing Residential Electric Bills

The City of Fairfield is committed to protecting residents' energy costs amidst volatile and rising markets. Thus, the city has continued its contract with Dynegy Energy Services to be the city's electric aggregation supplier. The negotiated electricity generation rate is highly competitive at \$0.0939 per kWh. While this is a significant increase from the previous rate of \$0.0617 per kWh, **the secured aggregation rate will still generate real savings for most residents**. The new rate is effective June 2025 and ends in May 2026. Eligible residents and businesses are automatically enrolled in the program, but anyone who wishes to opt-out of the program may do so.

What is Energy Aggregation?

Community electric and natural gas aggregation programs combine the residential and small business purchasing power of a larger “aggregated” group in pursuit of lowering and stabilizing energy prices.

Background

On November 7, 2023, the majority of voters in the City of Fairfield voted “Yes” on giving City Council the authority to start energy aggregation programs. Since then, the City has become a certified aggregator with the Public Utilities Commission of Ohio (PUCO). Being a certified aggregator allows city officials to negotiate utility rates for the electric and natural gas use for residents and small businesses that use Duke Energy Ohio.

Frequently Asked Questions

Why is my bill more expensive?

The overall cost of energy has increased dramatically across the entire PJM region due to various factors beyond our control (global events and market conditions, increased demand, infrastructure updates, fuel costs, etc.). This trend is affecting all areas within the PJM footprint.

How will Fairfield's electric aggregation program save me money?

Electric aggregation will help lower the generation charges on your Duke bill.

Can I opt-out?

Yes, opt-out letters were sent out notifying eligible residents that they would be automatically enrolled in the program, but they have the choice to decline participation.

What happens if I opt-out?

If you opt-out of the aggregation program you will be placed on Duke's default rate. The program is designed to protect residents from higher default rates by securing a more favorable and stable energy price.

How to read your electric bill

While Fairfield's electric aggregation program will not change delivery charges billed by Duke, the program is designed to lower and stabilize generation charges. Remember, Duke Energy will continue to deliver the electricity to your home, and you will continue to receive a single energy bill from Duke Energy each month.

In Case No. 21-887-EL-AIR, the PUCO approved an adjustment to Rider ETCJA, Electric Tax Cuts and Job Initiatives Rider. Overall, a typical residential customer using 1,000 kWh per month will see a decrease of approximately \$0.60 or -0.36% per month effective March 3, 2025.

In Case No. 21-482-EL-RDR, the PUCO approved an adjustment to Rider EE-PDRR (Energy Efficiency and Peak Demand Rider). A typical residential customer using 1,000 kWh per month will see a decrease of \$0.55 or -0.33% per month effective February 2025.

Riders are costs the Public Utilities Commission of Ohio has approved to cover investments in improving the energy infrastructure or other additional expenses.

- Default Rate:** The default rate, or “fallback” option is the price your local utility company charges for electricity or natural gas supply if you haven't chosen an alternative supplier. In volatile energy markets, default rates can be significantly higher than rates secured through aggregation programs.
- Delivery Charge:** This charge covers the cost of transporting the electricity or natural gas to your home or business. Your local utility company is responsible for delivery, even if you choose a different energy supplier.
- Aggregation Rate:** The negotiated price of electricity or natural gas supply secured by a municipality on behalf of its residents or businesses. The municipality's negotiation focuses on securing a favorable generation charge rate for residents. This charge covers the cost of producing the actual electricity. It refers specifically to the supply or generation portion of the energy bill, not the delivery charges.

FAIRFIELD FIRE DEPARTMENT NEWS

Using Technology to Bolster Fire Response

This Spring, the Fairfield Fire Department teamed up with fire training coordinators from across Butler County to host a joint training program focused on the use of thermal imaging cameras (TICs) during fire response. This program equipped participating firefighters with a deep understanding of thermal imaging cameras—powerful tools that detect heat energy to reveal hidden dangers and guide firefighters through thick smoke to locate victims, rescue pets, while identifying sources of fire.

Firefighters from 12 Butler County departments, including the City of Fairfield, Monroe, Liberty Township, Middletown, Hamilton, West Chester Township, Trenton, Oxford, Fairfield Township, Madison Township, and Saint Clair Township, participated in focused four-hour sessions, sharpening their skills in situational awareness, fire attack, victim detection, and understanding thermal properties of buildings and landscapes.

The FFD deeply values collaborative learning opportunities and is encouraged to share that these continued training efforts undoubtedly strengthen the region's firefighting force with knowledge and readiness.

When Severe Weather Strikes...

Weather in Southwest Ohio can be unpredictable, but you can certainly do your part to be prepared for potential hazards associated with severe weather. It is essential that you have multiple ways to be notified of severe weather BEFORE it strikes. Please be aware- **in the City of Fairfield, Outdoor Warning Sirens are only sounded when a Tornado Warning has been issued by the National Weather Service.** Because Outdoor Warning Sirens are only intended to warn those who are outside to seek immediate shelter indoors, do not rely on the sirens alone to alert you of a Tornado Warning, especially if you are indoors. Easy and low-cost ways to ensure you are alerted of severe weather in your area include having a NOAA weather radio at home (available at most hardware stores and online) and downloading local news and weather apps.



Before severe weather strikes, identify your family's "safe space" - where you will go to seek shelter if a Tornado Warning is issued. Be proactive, and if possible, stock your safe space with essential items that your family will want or need to use if you must shelter for an extended period of time. When severe weather is forecasted, keep devices charged and ready to receive alerts and emergency updates in case your home loses power. You can also help protect your home prior to a storm by securing outdoor furniture or items that may cause damage if picked up and blown by strong winds. Remember - there is no safe place outdoors when thunder and lightning are present. Stay safe and stay indoors!

FROM THE DESK OF THE CHIEF

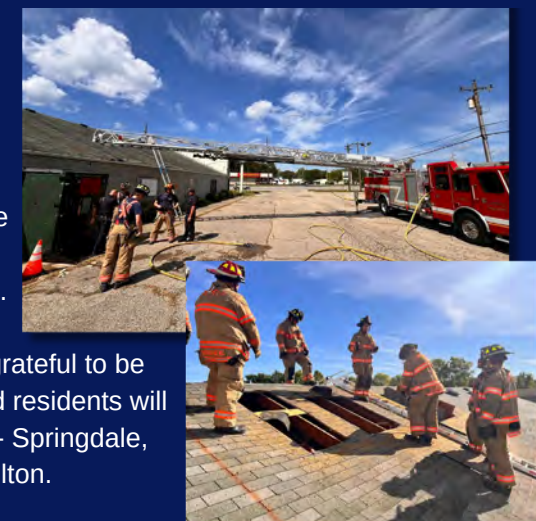


We are often asked why fire departments from other communities are responding to incidents within the City of Fairfield. There is often the assumption that a fire or other incident is so severe that the FFD needs to request additional assistance in order to manage the emergency. While that is sometimes the case, most often we request assistance from a neighboring community in order to comply with the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) Standard 1710.

NFPA 1710 is a national standard that sets the minimum requirements for how career fire departments should respond to emergencies, with the goal of ensuring both public safety and firefighter safety. NFPA 1710 sets guidelines related to emergency response times and minimum staffing based on the occupancy of the emergency. Essentially what this means is- the larger the building that is on fire, the more firefighters that are recommended to respond, based on the size, complexity and life safety risks that may be involved in fighting a fire in such a building.

So how does the FFD put this standard into action? Over 60% of the FFD's structure fire responses are for multi-dwelling buildings (apartments) or commercial structures- which according to the NFPA, 28 firefighters are recommended to respond on the initial alarm to an incident in both types of structures. Because the daily staffing of the entire FFD is a total of 18 firefighters, who may or may not all be available to respond at the time of the call, we utilize an automatic mutual aid agreement with neighboring fire departments to reach the recommended response strength of 28 firefighters. Under these mutual aid agreements, the FFD also responds to structure fire responses in neighboring communities when the need arises. We are very grateful to be supported by such effective and reliable departments, and hope our Fairfield residents will especially welcome and thank the departments that help us most frequently- Springdale, Forest Park, Colerain, Fairfield Township, West Chester Township and Hamilton.

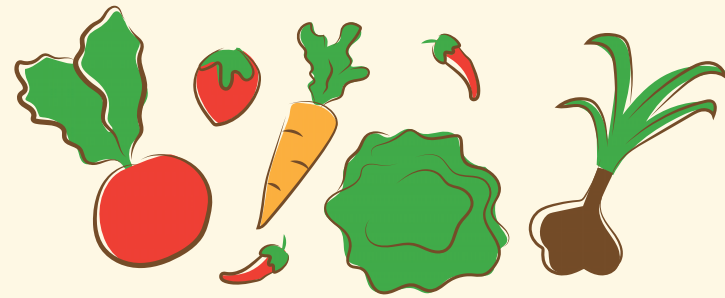

MEET KEEGAN

MARSH PARK'S RESOURCE MANAGER

With a wildlife biology and conservation background, Keegan Caplinger is passionate about preserving nature and making Marsh Park a vibrant place for people and wildlife. We asked him a few questions to get to know him better:

What led you to work in parks and resource management?

My graduate research was mainly focused on investigating ways in which human activity influences animal and plant communities in natural areas. Working in parks lets me take a straightforward and hands-on approach to fully enhancing natural areas for wildlife.

What's your favorite part of working at Marsh Park?

My favorite part is that it really lets me exercise my knowledge on habitat restoration and land stewardship and be creative about how I can accomplish this work in the park. I enjoy studying the natural environment around the lake and determining what actions will be most ecologically beneficial to wildlife.

Share a memorable experience while working with the Marsh Park community?

Probably my most memorable experience so far was working with a group of volunteers to build fish structures to sink into the lake. It was quite a cold Saturday morning in November, yet we could build over fifty structures in just a few hours. It's pretty cool that community members are passionate enough about Marsh Park to come out early on a weekend and work in the cold to help improve the park.

What projects are you excited about?

I've been clearing invasive species to help native plants thrive and create biodiversity hotspots in the park. We've also built and placed fish structures in the lake to support aquatic life, planted wildflowers for pollinators like Monarchs, and added bird nest boxes to attract species like Tree Swallows. I'm especially looking forward to introducing spring wildflowers along the trails and continuing habitat improvements.


