

Jungle Jim's International Market Celebrates 50 Years

This year marked a milestone for one of Fairfield's most iconic destinations: Jungle Jim's International Market celebrated its 50th anniversary. What started in 1971 as a small roadside produce stand has grown into a world-famous shopping experience, drawing visitors from across the region and beyond.

Jungle Jim's opened its brick-and-mortar location in Fairfield in 1975 and has expanded its footprint numerous times to more than 200,000 square feet. Known today for its massive selection of international foods, whimsical displays, and one-of-a-kind atmosphere, Jungle Jim's has become not only a grocery store but also a community landmark and tourist attraction.

Over the past five decades, Jungle Jim's has remained dedicated to bringing global flavors to Fairfield while supporting local farmers, businesses, and events. As Jungle Jim's celebrates this golden anniversary, the City of Fairfield celebrates alongside it, proud to be the home of a destination that has become a beacon for food lovers everywhere.

Flavors of Fairfield Roundup

The second year of the Flavors of Fairfield promotion, a collaboration between Travel Butler County and the City, recently concluded with remarkable success. Featuring 27 local bakeries and restaurants, the program generated over 1,045 business visits—a 17% increase from the previous year.

Sixty-one participants visited at least eight of the featured locations to become eligible for the grand prize drawing. The three grand prize winners—Autumn Edington, Ann Parsell, and Brian Strom—each received a \$1,000 gift card to Jungle Jim's.



RYAN FIREPROTECTION FACILITY UNDERWAY



Schumacher Dugan Construction has officially started work on a new 30,000-square-foot facility at 5200 Union Centre Boulevard. The building will serve as the new home for Ryan Fireprotection Inc., which is consolidating the operations of its recently acquired company, Cincinnati-Dayton Fire Protection.

This \$9 million investment, which includes the cost of land, construction, and new equipment, will allow the company to bring 53 employees—from engineers and technicians to project managers and office staff—under one roof in Fairfield. The new space will also feature a training center for both employees and clients, supporting the company's continued growth in the region.

The city is proud to welcome Ryan Fireprotection to the community. This project not only adds a high-quality national business but also strengthens Fairfield's role as a hub for advanced services and specialized industries. Through the City's Community Reinvestment Area (CRA) program, the project will be supported with a 6-year property tax abatement while providing direct annual payments to Fairfield City Schools and Butler Tech.

Construction is expected to be completed early in 2026.



Mercy Urgent Care Opens

City officials recently joined Mercy Health representatives to celebrate the grand opening and ribbon-cutting of the new Mercy Health Urgent Care and Occupational Health facility.



Located conveniently within the Jungle Jim's complex, the new facility expands access to high-quality, immediate medical care for non-emergency needs of residents and visitors. With this opening, Mercy Health continues its mission of delivering accessible and affordable care while strengthening Fairfield's growing network of local health services.

TOWN CENTER BANKS GET A REFRESH

Two long-standing financial institutions in Fairfield's Town Center have a fresh look. LCNB National Bank recently finished a remodel of its Nilles Road branch, giving the location a modern update with more welcoming spaces and improved technology to better serve customers.

Fifth Third Bank also completed interior and exterior renovations on its Wessel Drive location. By reinvesting in their physical spaces, both banks are helping to keep the Town Center attractive and convenient for customers.

In addition, construction is well underway at the new Bank of America located at 780 Nilles Road, with completion expected in early 2026.





Protecting Against Porch Piracy

The holiday season is a time for celebrating with friends and family, eating good food, and exchanging gifts with those you care about. With the ever-increasing popularity of online shopping, your joy can quickly turn to anger and frustration if your holiday packages fall prey to porch piracy.

According to a 2025 report from the US Postal Service Inspector General, an estimated 58 million packages were stolen from doorsteps, costing American families and businesses a staggering \$16 billion in financial losses.

Here are a few simple steps you can take to protect your deliveries and reduce the chances of becoming a victim of package theft.



Preventing Holiday Package Theft

- **Use secure delivery options.** Most carriers offer in-store pickup, delivery lockers, the ability to schedule specific delivery times, or request a signature upon delivery.
- **Track your packages.** Use delivery alerts and notifications so you know exactly when to expect your order.
- **Consider alternative delivery locations.** If you live in an area where secure delivery is difficult, have your packages delivered to a P.O. box, your office/workplace, or a family member's home instead.
- **Enlist your neighbors to help.** If you know you won't be home when a delivery is expected, ask a trusted neighbor to retrieve your package for you and offer the same courtesy to them.
- **Keep delivery areas visible.** Good lighting and a clutter-free porch make it harder for a package thief to go unnoticed.
- **Invest in home security.** Having a visible doorbell camera or package locker can help prevent criminals from targeting you.



Package Theft Action Steps

Confirm the delivery. Check the tracking information from the retailer or shipping company. Speak with your neighbors to make sure the package wasn't delivered to them by accident.

Never try to be a hero. If you catch a thief in the act, it's okay to shout or make noise but you should never try to physically intervene. Gather as many details about the thief as possible, e.g. physical appearance, make/model of the vehicle, license plate number, etc.

Report the theft. Contact the Fairfield Police Department at 513-829-8201 to file a report. Provide as many details as possible. If you have video footage or saw suspicious activity, let us know. Even small details can make a difference.

Notify the retailer or carrier. Many companies will replace stolen items or assist with filing a claim.

Working Together to Prevent Crime

Package theft is not just an inconvenience – it's a crime that impacts the entire Fairfield community. If you have a security or doorbell camera at your home, office, or storefront, consider signing up for CommunityWatch Fairfield. By voluntarily registering the location of your camera(s) with the Fairfield Police Department, you can help our investigators quickly locate potential video evidence, which is a powerful tool in solving crimes like package theft.

If we take precautions and look out for one another, we can help reduce these incidents and keep our neighborhoods safe. Together, we can protect Fairfield and ensure the holiday season remains joyful for everyone!


Studies have shown that interacting with a dog allows people to relax and decompress from stress and anxiety- and in the firefighting profession, it is so important to acknowledge and manage these realities. The Fairfield Fire Department is committed to making the mental health of our members a priority- and having a therapy dog available within the department on every Unit Day allows us to do just that!

Prior to the dogs' arrival, Captain Jon Krueckeberg, Captain Mike Weiss, and FAO Scott Colvin attended a week-long training with the Brevard County (FL) Sheriff's Office's "Paws and Stripes College," where they were issued their dogs and learned to be effective therapy dog handlers. During the intensive handler training, the new handler-canine pairs interacted with the public in various high-traffic spaces, such as Carnival Cruise Line's port facility and the Ron Jon Surf Shop.

Betty, Rusty, and Turbo are not only a source of joy and comfort for employees around the firehouse, they also have been busy connecting with community members at outreach events. The Fairfield Fire Department is so excited to see the good work these canines do in our firehouses and out in the community in the years to come!

Let it Snow, Let it Snow, Let it Snow

Help us keep the community safe this winter by keeping fire hydrants accessible to firefighters during snowy weather. If you have a fire hydrant near your home or in your yard, please keep them clear with these guidelines in mind:

1. Remove any snow and ice on or near the hydrants.
2. Clear a wide enough perimeter around the hydrant for firefighters to work (about 3 feet).
3. Clear a path from the hydrant to the street.

Use caution when shoveling snow and take frequent breaks to rest and hydrate.

Holiday Fire Safety

Between an increase in holiday cooking, potential decoration dangers, and unsafe heating practices - winter is a top season for home fires. Protect your family and keep this season jolly with some very simple and practical safety tips.




The importance of smoke alarms cannot be underestimated- whether you are hosting Thanksgiving, Friendsgiving, or just enjoying the most wonderful time of the year- having properly working smoke alarms is key to protecting your family and home from fire dangers. **Be sure that your home has a working smoke alarm on every level of your home, with an alarm inside each sleeping room, and near the kitchen area.**

When preparing your Thanksgiving turkey, never attempt to deep fry a fully-frozen turkey. Frozen turkeys plunged into hot oil can cause a large and consuming fire that can quickly get out of control. Be sure to thaw your turkey before frying and keep your deep fryer a safe distance away from your house, off wooden decking, in case of fire. While preparing side dishes or an oven-baked turkey, never leave food on the stove or in the oven unattended.

We know you want to stay "Merry and Bright," but holiday decorations can pose fire hazards if unsafely implemented. If your family celebrates with a real evergreen Christmas tree, water the tree regularly to prevent it from drying out. When a real tree dries out, it is important to safely dispose of it quickly, as a dry tree is highly flammable. Whether using a real or artificial tree, it is important to be sure not to overload electrical outlets with lights and other decorations to avoid sparking an electrical fire. Always remember to turn off or unplug decorations when you leave home or go to sleep for the night. Additionally, if decorating with candles, never leave an open flame unattended, or within reach of small children or animals.

ANNUAL LEAF COLLECTION



Fairfield's annual leaf collection is scheduled to begin Monday, November 3, 2025. This program provides free leaf collection services to residents.

Residents are advised not to place leaves in the street, as gutters and storm sewers can become blocked and cause localized flooding during moderate to heavy rainfall. Please help make the collection program run as smoothly as possible by raking your leaves between the curb and sidewalk, or in areas without curb, adjacent to the street. Please do not park in front of or near the piles between the hours of 7:00 a.m. and 8:00 p.m. as the trucks/equipment cannot reach them, those piles will be left until the next scheduled collection week. For the safety of our workers and the equipment, we also ask that residents not place grass clippings, sticks, or brush in with leaves.

Depending on weather and volume of leaves, crews may run a little ahead or a bit behind schedule from time to time, but please have leaves raked to the curbside by the posted dates. If crews are ahead of schedule, they will always come back again for the scheduled week.

Residents who have a small amount of leaves, or who do not wish to participate in the program, may find it more convenient to bag their leaves and place them curbside for pick-up on the regular trash collection day.
