CITY OF FAIRFIELD 2025 INCOME TAX FILING INFORMATION

Who Needs to File:

- Residents between the ages of 18-65 (including part-year residents).
- Residents 65 years or older with taxable income.
- Businesses operating in Fairfield.
- Employees working in Fairfield whose employer did not fully withhold Fairfield taxes.
- Non-residents with income or losses from self-employment and/or rental property earned within the City limits.

When to File:

- Individuals and Business Net-Profit (excluding fiscal year filers) due **April 15, 2026**.
- Employer reconciliations due **February 28, 2026**.
- Please visit our website for details on extensions of time to file your return.

What is Needed to File:

Individuals

- Federal 1040 with any applicable schedules
- W-2(s)
- Any additional supporting documentation

Business Net-Profit Returns

- Completed business return with Schedules X and Y
- Federal Tax Return
- Any supporting statements, schedules, or other documentation

Employer Withholding Reconciliations

- Completed Fairfield Reconciliation form
- Employee W-2(s) in electronic or paper format (see website for details)


Home Improvement Projects = Permits Needed

With the return of nice spring weather, many people begin planning their "honey-do" projects. The Fairfield Building Department would like to remind all homeowners to check with the City before starting your project to find out what permits and inspections are required.

Contrary to popular belief, building officials and inspectors are not out to make your life difficult or waste your time and money. These permits exist TO ENSURE YOUR SAFETY.


Examples of projects requiring a permit:

- Home Renovations or Additions
- Finishing Basements
- Garages
- Re-roofing
- Decks
- Fences
- Swimming Pools
- Sheds
- Retaining Walls
- Window Replacements
- Siding
- Driveway Expansions



It is always best to assume you need a permit for any project, unless Building Division staff informs you otherwise. The City has knowledgeable, experienced, and friendly staff available and eager to help residents. Feel free to contact the Building Division at (513) 867-5318 or BuildingandZoning@FairfieldOH.gov.

NOTE: Please make sure to remind your contractors to obtain permits for any work performed at your house. You as the homeowner are ultimately responsible for having the permit.



Spring Sewer Root Control

- The intrusion of tree roots into wastewater collection pipes is the most destructive problem encountered in a sewer system
- Sanitary sewer root intrusion can reduce or block flow, cause overflows/backups and reduce hydraulic capacity resulting in costly permanent structural damage and or costly property damage
- Codified Ordinance 925.05 (f) states: The owner is responsible for the cleaning of the sewer service from his house or building to the public sewer main. The owner is responsible for the maintenance of the sewer service from his house or building to the limit of the public right of way.
- In urban areas, tree roots may have a hard time finding good sources of nutrients
- Tree roots infiltrate pipes through cracks and joints
- Tree roots thrive in sewer pipes; the sanitary sewer system is the perfect source of nutrients; sewers are well-ventilated, oxygen-rich, and full of water and nutrients
- Roots have three basic functions: (1) they anchor the plant and hold it upright; (2) they store food for the plant; (3) they absorb and conduct water and nutrients
- Root growth in trees is generally greatest in the spring before leafing, during this time roots are collecting and distributing nutrients
- Sewer stoppages are the way that most homeowners find out about root problems, sewers are under ground, so root problems are not noticed until backups occur
- Effective use of early preventive root control can avoid costly permanent structural damage and backups
- Annual preventative tips: An annual chemical root control program can be an effective preventive maintenance measure. These products can generally be found in the plumbing section of most Home Improvement Centers or at your local hardware store. Chemicals must be labeled EPA approved; or An annual mechanical cleaning by a professional contractor specializing in drain cleaning

ENVIRONMENTALLY FRIENDLY LAWN CARE FOR SPRING

Spring is the perfect time to get your yard ready for the warm months ahead.

Simple changes in how we care for our lawns can help protect our soil, water, and local wildlife.

The good news is that small steps can make a big difference, and they don't have to be hard or expensive.



CLEAN UP WINTER DEBRIS

Start by cleaning up winter debris like sticks and leaves. This helps your lawn breathe and grow. When mowing begins, keep your mower blade sharp so it cuts cleanly. Experts recommend mowing high—about 3 inches—because taller grass shades the soil, keeps weeds down, and helps roots grow strong.



USE FEWER CHEMICALS

You can also choose to use fewer chemicals this spring. Instead of using quick-fix fertilizers, try slow-release or natural options. These feed the lawn gently and reduce runoff into local streams. Pulling weeds by hand or spot-treating only where needed also cuts down on unnecessary chemicals.



WATER WISELY

Watering wisely is another easy way to help the environment. Most lawns only need about one inch of water per week, including rain. Water early in the morning so your lawn absorbs more and loses less to evaporation. Healthy soil holds water better, so consider leaving grass clippings on the lawn to return nutrients to the ground.

City of Fairfield Residential Tree Program

Let's work together to maintain Fairfield as a great "Tree City" with a thriving urban forest.

The Residential Tree Program provides the City's homeowners with a 50% co-pay, up to \$200, for a tree purchased from Meyer's Garden Center & Landscaping or Lakeview Garden Center & Landscaping.

GUIDELINES

- Tree must be purchased from Meyer's Garden Center & Landscaping (5072 Dixie Hwy) or Lakeview Garden Center & Landscaping (6061 Pleasant Ave).
- The tree must be planted on the resident's property or (if approved by the City) in the public right-of-way.
- Program runs from April 1 through November 1, 2026.
- An approved application is required prior to purchase to ensure that funds are available.
- Each property owner may request one tree per year.
- Second tree requests will be considered after October 1 if funding is available

2025 Route 4 Sidewalk - Donald Drive to Hicks Boulevard

Project Description

This project was designed to improve the pedestrian connectivity along Route 4 in this commercial area. There is some foot traffic in this area already and the sidewalk will fill in existing gaps on Route 4 while setting up future sidewalk projects that would fill in the gap on Donald Drive.

This sidewalk connection was identified in the City's Active Transportation Plan and funded through local funds from the City of Fairfield's Street Improvement Fund and a Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) for \$130,300.



Building a Safer Community



Many of the most fun and rewarding aspects of working for the Fairfield Fire Department are the opportunities for FFD members to interact with the community in a low-stress environment. Our department is a proud partner to many community groups and Fairfield stakeholders- promoting life safety skills and fire prevention knowledge at trainings and special events. Throughout the 2025 year, members of the FFD spent more than **285 personnel hours** participating in community engagement opportunities- including life safety training courses, like AED/CPR, "Stop the Bleed," and fire extinguisher operation, in addition to the Fairfield City Schools Reading Program, and having a steady presence at all Village Green major events. We are grateful to report that with the financial assistance of a FEMA Fire Prevention and Safety Grant, we were able to acquire fire extinguisher training aids that were put to good use at local businesses, Mercy Fairfield Hospital, and even in Health Class at Fairfield Freshman School!



New Department Life Safety Inspector

In the Fall of 2025, Lieutenant Shawn May was sworn in as a Life Safety Inspector for the FFD. Lt. May will be working hard to inspect City of Fairfield building plans to ensure that they meet fire codes, detect fire hazards, recommend prevention measures, ensure compliance with state and local fire codes, and investigate causes of fires.



Before Severe Weather Strikes...

Weather in the Southwest Ohio area can be unpredictable- no matter the season. One easy step you can take to be prepared for all weather conditions is to have multiple ways to be notified of severe weather.

Please be aware- in the City of Fairfield, Outdoor Warning Sirens are only sounded when a Tornado Warning has been issued by the National Weather Service. Because Outdoor Warning Sirens are only intended to warn those who are outside to seek immediate shelter indoors, do not rely on the sirens alone to alert you of a Tornado Warning, especially if you are indoors. Easy and low-cost ways to ensure you are alerted of severe weather in your area include having a NOAA weather radio at home (available at most hardware stores and online) and downloading local news and weather apps.



Before severe weather strikes, identify your family's "safe space"- where you will go to seek shelter if a Tornado Warning is issued. Be proactive, and if possible, stock your safe space with essential items that your family will want or need to use if you must shelter for an extended period of time. When severe weather is forecasted, keep devices charged and ready to receive alerts and emergency updates in case your home loses power. You can also help protect your home prior to a storm by securing outdoor furniture or items that may cause damage if picked up and blown by strong winds. Remember - there is no safe place outdoors when thunder and lightning are present. Stay safe and stay indoors!

One of our core beliefs at the Fairfield Fire Department is that, "We are family"- a belief that certainly comes into consideration when making important organizational decisions. As such, we are excited to share that after an amicable and productive contract negotiation period, the City of Fairfield and International Association of Firefighters Local 4010 have solidified an agreement that is fiscally responsible, competitive with area departments, and also reflects and recognizes the hard work and professionalism of our department members.

This three-year contract agreement bolsters the wellness program for FFD members to offer additional cancer screenings and required annual physical and behavioral health assessments-including focusing on mental health needs. We believe that our department succeeds and flourishes when FFD personnel are also thriving- and we are proud to commit to an employment contract that prioritizes the overall health and wellness of our members.

Additional notable elements of this new contract include: an increase in base pay, three additional vacation days, and a reduction in hours beginning in the third year of the agreement (2028).

The Fairfield Fire Department is determined to not only retain high caliber employees, but also attract new hires who fit the high standards of this department- making it essential to provide our department members with a contract that explicitly demonstrates their worth, sacrifices, and commitment to providing quality care and fire service. We are as excited as ever to see where the future of this department is heading, as we remain committed to providing excellent, professional service to the Fairfield community.

New Season, Old Tricks: Springtime Scam Awareness

Spring is one of the busiest seasons for fraud, with criminals often taking advantage of increased spending and seasonal routines. We want to help Fairfield residents recognize the warning signs of some of the most common scams and stay protected.

Tax-Related Scams

- **Beware Of:** Urgent messages claiming to be from the IRS demanding personal information or immediate payment via wire transfer, gift cards, or cryptocurrency.

Home Improvement & Contractor Scams

- **Beware Of:** Door-to-door offers or unsolicited calls for quick repairs, with requests for upfront payment or pressure to decide immediately.

Vacation Home Checks: Peace of Mind While You're Away

If you're planning a spring break trip or a long weekend away, the Fairfield Police Department offers **Vacation Home Checks** to help keep your property secure. While you're out of town, officers will conduct periodic exterior checks of your residence, looking for signs of suspicious activity, unsecured doors or windows, or anything else out of the ordinary.

Before leaving town, homeowners can also take a few simple steps to make their home look occupied:

- Consider placing interior lights on timers, stopping mail and package deliveries, and asking a trusted neighbor to bring in trash cans or flyers.
- Avoid posting travel plans or photos on social media until you return.
- Make sure all doors, windows, garages, and sheds are securely locked.

Step back in time! Come discover with us what the land that became Fairfield was like 250 years ago.

As part of the national celebration, we're dedicating a special series in our Fairfield Flyers to the history of this area. Join us as we explore local life in 1776, 1826, 1876, 1926, 1976, and 2026 - six glimpses into 250 years of change right outside your door.

What the Fairfield area was like in 1826

Fairfield has a rich history that stretches back long before its incorporation in 1955. To understand what the area was like, we need to travel back in time. Familiar street names today—Symmes Road, St. Clair Avenue, and Celadon Avenue—provide links to the past. Although the United States was only 50 years old by 1826, and most of the population lived in the East, signs of modern settlement were reaching the area.

Northwest Territory

The Congress of the Confederation passed the Northwest Ordinance in 1787, creating the Northwest Territory. The territory included the areas that would later become the states of Ohio, Indiana, Illinois, Michigan, Wisconsin, and part of Minnesota. The territory was initially governed by martial law. Arthur St. Clair served as the first governor of the territory. St. Clair and his territorial armies blazed the first trail of what is now Pleasant Avenue in Fairfield while traveling between Fort Washington at present-day Cincinnati and Fort Hamilton. The army sought to bring law and order to the wilderness country.

Symmes Purchase

A year after the founding of the Northwest Territory, Judge John Cleves Symmes made the famous Symmes Purchase. Symmes was a Revolutionary War officer and former delegate of the Continental Congress from New Jersey. The Symmes Purchase, also known as the Miami Purchase, was to include all the land between the mouth and source of the Great and Little Miami Rivers, but only the southern 311,682 acres were ultimately purchased.



Early Settlement

Judge Symmes gave his nephew Celadon Symmes an area roughly bounded by present-day Symmes Road, Pleasant Avenue, Nilles Road, and Route 4. Known as Section 34, this became the center of early Fairfield. The existing forest lands were slowly removed to make way for agriculture and settlement.

Modern Boundaries

The Northwest Territory went out of existence when Ohio became the 17th state on March 1, 1803. The remaining territory was then known as the Indiana Territory, before its current division into states. Butler County was established on March 24, 1803 from a portion of Hamilton County. Fairfield Township, the southern portion of which is the modern City of Fairfield, was also established the same year by the Court of General Sessions.







Fairfield FYI

Fairfield FYI is designed to allow Fairfield residents to quickly and easily request assistance for City services or report non-emergency issues from their smartphones or other mobile devices. The goal of the app is to build a strong relationship with residents and amplify the resident focused service model all City departments strive to uphold.



The three steps to report an issue or make a request:

- 1 Upload or take a picture in the app.
- 2 Choose the location associated with the issue or request.
- 3 Provide details related to the issue or request

By downloading Fairfield FYI, residents not only have the resources they want but they are also opening a two-way conversation with the City. The City can provide notices and updates regarding specific issues or location specific concerns, such as leaf collection or street closures, in addition to prompt attention to the requests submitted.

The Fairfield FYI app is available and free to download on mobile devices in Google Play and the Apple App Store.
