Frisch's Big Boy on Dixie Highway to be Remodeled

Frisch's Big Boy located at 6638 Dixie Highway will soon undergo



a remodel. Key exterior features of Frisch's new look will include warmer colors, rough-cut cedar plank siding, fabric awnings with the Frisch's trademarked, scripted "F," and new outdoor signage featuring the company's new look Big Boy mascot.

Inside, customers will be treated to even more changes including new flooring, lighting, fixtures, artwork and a welcome-wall entrance to personalize each location.

Frisch's CEO Jason Vaughn stated that "the changes, while significant in design, retain familiar elements that draw on Frisch's history and its longevity in the community. This is our most visible effort yet to show the community how Frisch's Big Boy is evolving to serve them."

The Fairfield remodel is expected to be finished in mid-November.

Lindenwald Station Moving to Fairfield



Lindenwald Station, a popular restaurant located in the Lindenwald area of Hamilton, is moving to Riepert Square, 5072 Pleasant Avenue (formerly Gene's Resale Shop) near the Village Green.

Owners Mike and Donna Cooper, who are Fairfield residents, are renovating the inside of the building and have painted the outside and re-paved the parking lot.

The Coopers are excited about this move because the Fairfield location provides more room for the restaurant and allows them to own the building instead of continuing to rent.

"I think it's going to be great," said Donna Cooper. "This new location will almost double our seating capacity, allows for more parking, and provides more space in the kitchen."

The Coopers anticipate that the extra dining area and kitchen space will provide the impetus to expand their current menu. Lindenwald Station will continue serving menu favorites such as fish and Reuben sandwiches (considered by many to be the best around), omelets, and sweet cream pancakes while transitioning specials to daily offerings and adding new menu items.

The restaurant will maintain its train theme and will add a new hand-painted train mural on the storefront. The expectation is for Lindenwald Station to open in this location in early 2018.

The newest restaurant to open on Dixie Highway is Jamaica Mon: Caribbean Cuisine. The restaurant is located in the retail center at 6679 Dixie Highway between Namaste Curry House and Jet's Pizza.





All About Water: Tanks, Lines and Sewers

Water Storage Tank Maintenance

Water tanks were on tap for routine maintenance and inspection this summer on Winton, Hunter and Seward Roads.

The tank on Winton was drained and a thorough inspection was completed in preparation for its re-painting in 2018. Tanks on Hunter and Seward Roads were pressure washed.


The Hunter Water Tank is at Harbin Park and is the City's largest with a capacity of three million gallons.

Waterline replacement on Rt. 4

A significant improvement to the City's ability to efficiently pump water through the Rt. 4 Booster Station to the eastern side of the City began this summer.

Excavation and pipe installation started near the intersection of Nilles Road and Rt. 4 and progressed south, ending at the Rt. 4 Bypass.

This work replaced two miles of a 60-year-old waterline and was mostly performed at night in order to limit the impact on businesses and traffic. It was scheduled to be completed ahead of the repaving of Rt. 4 that is planned for 2018.



Ross Road Relief Sewer Project

Increasing sewer capacity to safely move wastewater to the treatment plant during a large-scale storm is a priority for the Public Utilities Department.

Action on this priority occurred this summer when



900 feet of sanitary sewer under Ross Road and Woodridge Boulevard southeast of Gilbert Farms Park was enlarged.

This work was performed with no impact to the road.

Status of Street Projects

Thanks for your patience as the Public Works Department performed several street maintenance and repair projects throughout the summer and into the fall:

- Vinnedge/Walter/Fairfield Avenue road area improvements
- Holden/S. Gilmore/Port Union street resurfacing
- Miscellaneous curb repair; sidewalk and apron replacement
- Lake Mead/Lake Manor, Chesapeake Way, Arcade and Horning areas resurfacing
- Symmes Road paving and Seward Road shoulder widening
- Seward Road near northern railroad tracks headwall replacement
- Holden/HighSchool/Compass Elementary traffic signal improvements

Basketball Hoops in the Street

As we head into the winter basketball season, please keep in mind that all permanent or portable basketball hoops must be located completely on your property and outside of the public right-of-way which includes the sidewalk and street.

The Codified Ordinances of the City of Fairfield state that "No person... shall construct or place... any structure on any street, alley, public right-of-way, easement or public grounds....".

Hoops in the street are a safety hazard for the players, the motoring public, and passing or parked vehicles. They have led to accidents, injuries, and damaged property. Please help correct this safety issue by keeping your hoop off the street.



Quint 31 Ready for Service

In September, the Fire Department put a new Quint into service that replaced a vehicle that had been in operation for 25 years. A Quint is a fire service apparatus with the dual purpose of an engine and a ladder truck. It has five functions: pump, water tank, fire hose, aerial device, and ground ladders.



Grant Supports Increase in Fire Department Personnel

The Fairfield Fire Department has been awarded a three-year, \$810,122 federal grant from the U.S. Department of Homeland Security's Assistance to Firefighters Grants (AFG) program.

The grant, known as "S.A.F.E.R." (Staffing for Adequate Fire and Emergency Response), will assist in increasing the number of personnel per shift, which was a goal of the passage of the Fire and EMS Levy last year.

Hiring for these additional positions is expected to be complete by the end of this year. This grant will help to extend the life of the 2.5 mill levy.
