Telhio is remodeling and expanding in Village Green

Beginning this spring, Telhio Credit Union is undergoing a \$2 million remodel and expansion at 950 Deis Drive in Village Green. The expansion will increase the size of the branch to nearly 9,000 square feet.



Features of the remodel and expansion will include a more open layout, updated furnishings and décor and member conveniences such as a coin counting machine.

The branch will feature Telhio's dialogue banking concept which is a more personalized approach to transactions and financial discussions with member service representatives. Additionally, a community room will be available for local organizations to host small gatherings and meetings.

"Renovating this location will allow us to introduce a new level and style of service to our current members and to

those looking for a financial institution in Fairfield and the surrounding communities," said Leslie Bumgarner, CEO.



Local Business Services Representative, Brad Vanoss, added: "Telhio's expansion of our Village Green branch shows just how much we are dedicated to not only our members but to the City of Fairfield's residents as well. We want to support Fairfield in ANY way possible."

The Fischer Group plans major expansion

The Fischer Group is planning a major expansion and new construction project in the City of Fairfield.

This large project includes a 30,000 square foot addition to its manufacturing facility and a 20,000 square foot new corporate headquarters facility, both on Bohlke Boulevard. The total amount of building construction investment will be approximately \$3 million.

Within three years after completion of construction, The Fischer Group will add 100 employees.

"We're growing quite rapidly, and demand

president of The Fischer Group (and also a Fairfield resident). "We take an invention from patent to the market."

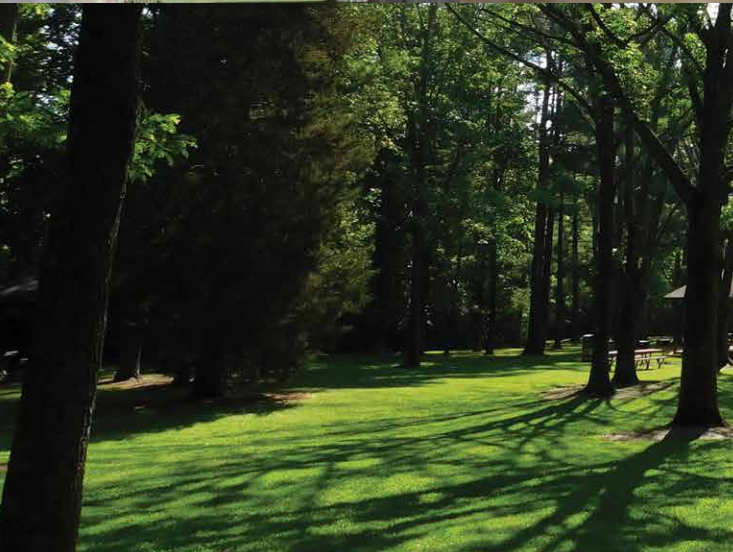

6. Use email and the internet safely.

Ignore unsolicited emails, be wary of attachments, links, and forms in emails that come from people you don't know or that seem "phishy." Avoid untrustworthy (often free) downloads.

7. Use secure connections.

Use remote connectivity and secure file transfer options when not on your home or work network.

8. Protect sensitive data.

Securely remove sensitive data files from your hard drive, especially when recycling or repurposing your computer. Use desktop firewalls. Make sure they are on and properly configured.

"Respect 101" marks start of City's diversity initiative

Leaders from The University of Cincinnati (UC) Division of Equity, Inclusion & Community Impact delivered a half-day workshop for 73 supervisory staff across all City departments on Thursday, January 31, 2019.

UC Facilitators, Matt Olovson and Dr. Dy'an Marinos, presented "Respect 101," which was a half-day session touching on anti-harassment, non-discrimination, diversity, equity, and inclusion. This training marked the start of a greater diversity management and recruitment effort on the part of the City.



During the sessions, supervisors, managers and directors learned about preventing and identifying harassment, understanding diversity, and creating an inclusive work environment for employees and the public. They also took part in several group exercises.

Fire hydrant flushing to begin in April

The Water Division performs annual hydrant flushing primarily to improve water quality by removing built-up sediment from the public water lines. The routine operation of fire hydrants is also helpful in identifying mechanical issues with the hydrants so that they can be properly serviced.



Starting in April, the Water Division will perform hydrant flushing on four to five consecutive

Thursdays until the entire City has been covered. Water main line flushing will start around noon each Thursday and continue for six to eight hours.

As in the past, the City will provide advance notice to residents who may be impacted by the flushing program via social media posts and the Code Red emergency alert phone system.

Residents may experience discolored water for a short time during or after flushing. If this occurs, residents should run water through several inside faucets for five to 10 minutes until the water becomes clear.

Veritiv's employees have been trained
over the past several months in sessions
conducted at the fire station on Dixie
Highway. Employees have learned
how to administer cardiopulmonary
resuscitation (CPR) and basic first aid
as well as operate an automated
external defibrillator (AED.)

Learning how to prevent injury

The City recently joined with the Ohio
Bureau of Workers' Compensation
(BWC) and representatives from the
Public Employment Risk Reduction
Program (PERRP) to deliver the course
"Advanced Safety for Public Employers
(ASPE)" on site.

This partnership represents the first
time that the BWC has done the



training on site with just one
City's employees.

Employees and supervisors
representing nearly every
division and department
learned how to identify risks
and prevent hazards that
commonly impact workers.
Sessions, conducted in
January and February for
two and a half days, addressed how
employees could get hurt on the job
and how that risk can be reduced or
eliminated.

On the first day of class in January, all
26 participants toured the Wastewater
Treatment Facility on Groh Lane to



learn how to identify and perform
hazard risk assessments.

Class participants who completed
both parts of the course received an
ASPE certification card from PERRP
on the last day of class in February.

Before first responders arrive: “Stop the Bleed”

Deputy Fire Chief Tom Wagner initiated a project to provide the training and equipment necessary for City employees to control life-threatening bleeding.

Using a nationwide program called “Stop the Bleed,” Deputy Chiefs Wagner and Randy McCreadie taught employees in the Water, Waste Water, Public Works, and Parks & Recreation Departments as well as employees in the City Building proper techniques for bleeding control. Each session lasted an hour and included a classroom presentation and demonstrations of the techniques using tourniquets and hemorrhage control dressings.

The second part of this initiative was to give employees access to the supplies they would need to control life-threatening bleeding. Using input from management in each department, vehicles were identified that needed portable bleeding control kits. Larger, wall-mounted kits are being purchased for various City facilities.

The goal of this effort was to equip employees with the knowledge and tools to take immediate action in the event of life-threatening blood loss. A person with a significant injury can bleed to death in four minutes. In some cases, it might take more than four minutes for Emergency Medical Services (EMS) crews to arrive on the scene. If by-standers engage the victim and begin to control the bleeding prior to EMS arrival, lives can often be saved.



Severe weather – do you have a plan?

Spring can bring strong winds and rain, and even tornadoes. Where will your family go in your house or where will you go in your place of business? Where is the safest place or location?



Safety tips for spring - work zones – focus on safe driving!

Spring is when the City's crews are out and about on roads and in parks repairing potholes, mowing grass, trimming weeds, etc. As you are driving throughout the City, please be aware of them!

1. Be alert – expect anything to occur.
2. Don't tailgate – unexpected stops frequently occur.
3. Don't speed – note the posted speed limits.
4. Don't change lanes – the time saved isn't worth the chance of hurting someone.
5. Minimize distractions – avoid changing the radio and using cell phones.

Brush and limb pickup April to October

The Public Works Department is again providing a call-in brush and limb pickup program to residents from April to October. Residents who wish to have brush and limbs picked up can arrange to do so by:

1. **Calling 867-4200 at least one week in advance of the scheduled pickup areas; or**
2. **Emailing public_works@fairfield-city.org**

The three pickup areas will be the same as those used for the City's leaf pickup program. Brush and limb pickups will be scheduled starting the first Monday of each month as follows:

- **The first week of each month – areas west of Pleasant Avenue (U.S. 127)**
(Starting the week of April 1 and ending the week of October 7)
- **The second week of each month – areas between Pleasant Avenue and Winton Road**
(Starting the week of April 8 and ending the week of October 14)
- **The third week of each month – areas east of Winton Road**
(Starting the week of April 15 and ending the week of October 21)

Remember that small quantities of brush and limbs can be placed with regular trash that Rumpke will pick up at no charge.

In addition, brush and limbs can be dropped off on the second Saturday of each month all year, at the end of Groh Lane. Parks crews will be on hand from 8 a.m. until Noon on these Saturdays. No leaves or grass clippings are accepted and users of this service must present proof of Fairfield residence.
