City's golf courses are ready to play

It's prime golf season, and maintenance at the City's two golf courses – Fairfield Greens North Trace and South Trace - is in "full swing."

"The maintenance staff has been working all spring to get the courses in proper condition to be enjoyable and playable for the summer and fall seasons," said Keith Crutcher, Golf Professional. "The staff will continue to work daily on the courses to make and keep everything healthy!"

The various layers of grass on the greens and tees have received an extra amount of attention, with aeration and seeding as a primary focus. Trees at some of the holes have been removed due to the roots causing problems on the greens and because they were dying.

Derek Baxter, Golf Superintendent of turf maintenance, said the wet spring season sparked a good growing season.

"Several days in a row of 65 degree and over temperatures have also been helpful," Derek said. "The warmer soil temperatures are needed for the seed to germinate and really establish a strong root system to keep the turf healthy."

Todd Dodge, who has more than 20 years of turf management experience, was a welcome addition to the full-time maintenance team in March.

Parks and Recreation Director Tiphanie Howard is pleased with the hard work and dedication from the staff and the obvious progress that has been accomplished this spring on the courses.

"We are finishing the development of a three to five year master plan to grow and sustain golf conditions and operations at both Fairfield Greens courses," Tiphanie said. "We are excited that the first tangible project is the improvement of water features over the next several weeks."

Another part of the master plan is to establish pollinator habitats at the two courses and throughout the City's 37 other parks and facilities. Pollinators – bees and butterflies – are responsible for producing a large portion of the world's food supply.

"One of the principles of our mission in the Parks and Recreation Department is conservation – being good stewards of our resources," Tiphanie said. "Creating pollinator habitats helps achieve this mission. These habitats also give us the benefit of providing more park land that is less costly to maintain."

Other parts of the master plan that have been accomplished recently include freshening the Phalen Center with new carpet, paint and trim, and implementing an updated point of sale system.

Rolled Alloys plans expansion

Rolled Alloys, a global leader in specialty metals and heat and corrosion-resistant alloys, is adding office and manufacturing space at its Fairfield facility located at 4085 Thunderbird Lane.



Headquartered in Temperance, Mich., the Fairfield location specializes in producing products for the aerospace industry.

The facility will expand by 45,000 square feet (5,000 office and 40,000 manufacturing), adding to its existing 66,000 square feet for a total of 111,000 square feet. Total building investment will be \$3.5 million.

After completion of the addition, the current 50 employees will be retained and 10 employees will be added.

"The market's been good, there's a strong economy, and we've been happy with our existing facility," said Jim McConnell, General Manager.

To facilitate this expansion, Fairfield City Council authorized a five-year property tax abatement.

Kroger renovations: improving the customer experience

Kroger is investing \$1.5 million to renovate the interior of the Village Green grocery store.

These renovations include "smaller upgrades to give it a nice facelift," said Kroger Corporate Affairs Manager Erin Rolfes.

Customers will notice additional self-checkout lanes and a brighter and updated décor overall that includes new lights, dairy case, salad bar, and oven-ready seafood case.



"As our real estate team looked through the stores and the cadence at which they have been renovated, Fairfield's seemed like it was a good candidate for that extra love," said Rolfes.

The Fairfield Kroger opened in Village Green in the summer of 2002 and typically ranks as one of the most popular stores in Southwest Ohio.





Summer Safety Tips from Duke Energy

Summer is in the air which means we're ready to do some much needed repairs and upkeep to our homes. Here are some helpful tips to keep you safe:



- Look up! Always examine your surroundings for power line locations before doing any outside work.
- Electricity and water don't mix. Keep electrical appliances and toys away from water, including rain, wet ground, swimming pools, sprinklers and hoses.
- Meters and other electrical equipment may be located on the outside of a home or building. The meter measures the amount of electricity used. Never tamper with this or any electrical equipment. Tampering with meters is illegal and dangerous.

- Be cautious on the roof. Working on a roof may put you or tools you may be using close to an overhead power line. Please keep yourself and tools you may be using at least 10 feet away from power lines at all times.
- Use care when painting. When house painting, ensure that nothing, including you, your ladder, your scraper, your paintbrush or roller, comes in contact with the power line supplying electricity to your home by keeping yourself and these tools at least 10 feet away from the power line.
- Be careful with ladders and other metal objects. When using an aluminum ladder and other metal objects, check above you for power lines. Aluminum is an exceptionally good conductor of electricity. If you touch a power line while standing on an aluminum ladder, you could be seriously injured or killed. The same goes for antennas, metal gutters and other long metal objects. Take extra care to ensure that they don't inadvertently touch a power line. Stay at least 10 feet away from power lines at all times.

- Don't prune near power lines. Pruning trees or vegetation around power lines should only be attempted by trained professionals. Serious injuries and even fatalities have occurred when untrained individuals do this work without the assistance of qualified professionals. Please call us for an evaluation of the trees and vegetation around power lines prior to any removals.
- See something tangled in a power line? Stay clear. Never attempt to move an object (tree limb, kite, model airplane, etc.) from a power line yourself. Never climb the pole. Contact Duke Energy – we can help.
- Fly kites, model planes and balloons safely. Fly them only in wide-open spaces like a field or on a beach. Never fly them around power lines. Never use metal, foil or wire in your kite or kite string.
- Never touch a downed power line. If you see a downed power line, contact your local utility immediately. Don't touch the line or anything that is in contact with it. Don't attempt to move the line. Keep others away, and consider every wire on the ground to be energized and dangerous.

Tree Trimming

It's that time of year again. To provide safe and reliable service, Duke Energy must remove brush and trim trees along the power lines. These practices and techniques are approved by nationally recognized arborists, and helps us to continue in providing safe, reliable electricity.

The majority of our pruning and cutting occurs during routine line maintenance cycles. Our policy is to dispose of any small limbs and brush in landscaped settings. The larger pieces of wood are cut into manageable lengths for your use. In non-landscaped sites, pruned vegetation and wood is left in place. This material will bio-degrade into its natural components.



Comprehensive planning process update

Last summer, the City began a process to update its comprehensive plan that will guide how Fairfield should be developed and re-developed in the future. This effort is called *Fairfield Forward*. After collecting community feedback in open public forums and at community events, various stakeholder groups have met to focus discussion on these four specific areas:

- **South Gilmore/Mack Roads**
- **Town Center**

Most homeowners take great pride in their property and make diligent efforts to maintain every aspect of their home. The City greatly appreciates the collective efforts of homeowners to maintain their properties, as this has a significant impact on the desirability of the entire community.

When even one property falls into disrepair, the situation can negatively impact adjacent homes. To protect property values, Fairfield City Council has adopted a code that establishes minimum property maintenance standards for property owners to adhere to.

If residents see a property that looks as if it has been abandoned, has tall grass and weeds, or has other blighting issues, the City's Building & Zoning Division asks that it be reported. Reports can be made by phone or email.

During business hours, callers can talk directly with an inspector. After hours, callers can leave a message to be addressed the next day. Anonymous reports are accepted.

COMMON PROPERTY MAINTENANCE PROBLEMS



OVERGROWTH - Tall grass higher than eight inches and/or other vegetative overgrowth



GARBAGE & DEBRIS - Dilapidated furniture, household products, construction materials, etc.



HOUSE MAINTENANCE - Broken windows, roof and gutter problems, peeling paint, etc.



INOPERABLE OR UNLICENSED VEHICLES - Vehicles or trailers that are inoperable or unlicensed in residential areas



PARKING - Vehicles and/or trailers must be parked on paved surfaces, not grass



ACCESSORY STRUCTURES - Improperly maintained garages, sheds, fences, retaining walls, swimming pools, etc.
