Fairfield ranked one of best suburbs in Ohio

The City of Fairfield is one of the best metropolitan area suburbs in Ohio, according to recent studies conducted by GOBankingRates.com and SmartAsset.

A comprehensive study by GOBankingRates.com analyzed the cost of living, quality of schools, and safety in suburban areas surrounding the biggest cities across the country.

Factors included median home list prices and monthly rent, annual cost of groceries, health care, utilities and transportation, and violent and property crimes.

Fairfield came in as the number one suburb of Cincinnati in this review, and number five in Ohio overall.

The SmartAsset study ranked Fairfield as the number three easiest place in Ohio to sell a home, based on the number of days homes spend on the market in the area. At the time of the report (August), homes in Fairfield were selling within an average of 37.2 days, according to the study.

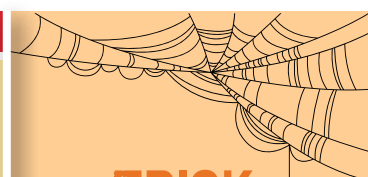

Drop it off at the North Pole Mailbox, located in the lobby of the Community Arts Center, by December 17.

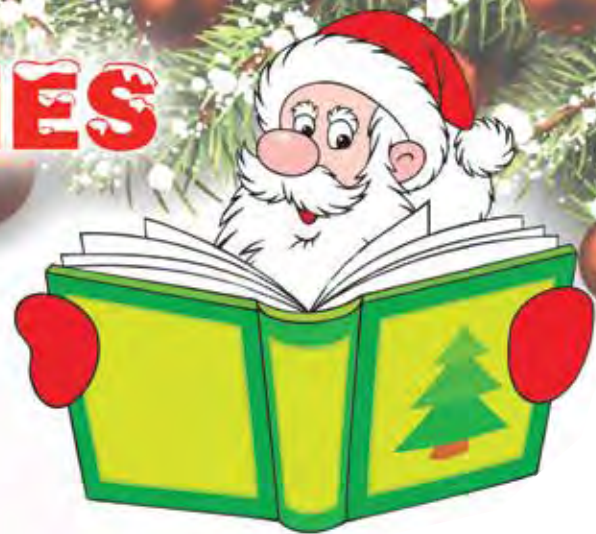
Per Santa's request, each letter should include a stamped, self-addressed envelope so that he can reply with a personal letter for each child.

HOLIDAY TREE RECYCLING

December 26 - January 10

Make your natural holiday tree useful after the holidays. Recycle your tree in the Fairfield Parks and Recreation Department's Holiday Tree Recycling program. Through this program, trees are shredded to produce mulch used in the City's parks and recreation system.

Trees may be dropped off at Waterworks Park on Groh Lane from December 26, 2019 through January 10, 2020. A Christmas tree disposal corral will be set up in the Waterworks Park south parking area (the parking lot closest to River Road.) Before leaving a tree, please be sure to remove all ornaments and tinsel.

CHIPPING PROGRAM

The Parks and Recreation Department will be accepting limbs and brush on the following dates:

Saturday, Nov. 9, 8 a.m.- Noon | Saturday, Dec. 14, 8 a.m.- Noon

Limbs and brush can be dropped off at the site on Groh Lane just past Waterworks Park. During these months there will not be any mulched chippings available for the public. Questions? Call the Parks and Recreation Department at 513-867-5348.

BRUSH & LIMB PICKUP

Every April to October, the Public Works Department provides a call-in brush and limb pickup. Residents wishing to have brush and limbs picked up can arrange to do so by calling Public Works, 513-867-4200, at least one week in advance of the scheduled pickup areas. (See the pickup areas schedule on the website at the above link under the title "Brush & Limb Pickup.")

OPERATION DUMP TRUCK

The Public Works Department will deliver a roll-off dump box, or in some cases an actual dump truck, for residents to load brush and limbs that are too large for the call-in program. The City will dispose of the items. Sign up for this service needs to be done in person at the City's Public Works Department, 8870 N. Gilmore Road, between 8 a.m. and 5 p.m., Monday through Friday. Call 513-867-4200 for details or visit the website.

LEAF COLLECTION

The Public Works Department provides free leaf collection services for residents who place leaves in rows or piles between the curb and the sidewalk or adjacent to the street in areas that do not have curbs or sidewalks. This service is provided from November to January.

Registration may be made by calling 867-5348 during office hours. Payment for telephone registration must be made by Visa, MasterCard, American Express or Discover.

Programs often fill quickly, so plan to register early. Note that the Parks and Recreation Department reserves the right to cancel any class due to poor registration. Cancellations will be announced on the Wednesday prior to the start of each new session.

REFUND & TRANSFER POLICY

- Full refunds will ONLY be issued when the Fairfield Parks and Recreation Department cancels the program. If your program is cancelled, you will be notified prior to the first class meeting, a full refund will be issued or you have the option to transfer to another class.
- Refunds will not be given if requested less than 7 days prior to the day a program is scheduled to begin.
- All refunds that are granted will be assessed a \$5 Administrative Processing Fee.
- Program transfers or changes will also be subject to a \$5 Administrative Processing Fee, unless the change is initiated by the Parks and Recreation Department.
- When a refund is requested - if the payment was made by cash or check, please allow up to 4 weeks to receive refund.
- If an individual program session needs to be cancelled due to instructor illness, weather, etc. every effort will be made to notify patrons in advance via email/phone. When possible, make-up classes will be held at the end of the session, during break week. Refunds will not be issued for make-up classes held at the end of the session.
- There are no make-ups or refunds for missed classes due to personal schedule conflicts.
- A charge of \$25 will be assessed on all returned checks.
- Exceptions: participant moves from the Fairfield area before the program begins (proof of move must be presented). Participant becomes ill (doctor's statement must be presented). Exceptions are still subject to the \$5 Administrative Fee

Comprehensive Plan nearing completion after final public open house

The year-long process to update the City's Comprehensive Plan included a final open house for public input on the draft plan on Tuesday, Sept. 24. Dozens of citizens and key stakeholders came to the open house at the Community Arts Center to study the plan and give feedback. The last milestone in this process will be City Council's adoption of the plan.

This plan that has been in process since August of 2018 will guide how the City of Fairfield will be developed and redeveloped in the future. Input has been received from citizens, elected officials, City staff, and business and community leaders in a variety of ways over the past year.

The City of Fairfield has long enjoyed its position as a quality, well-balanced community located just north of I-275, about 20 miles from Cincinnati. With its regional convenience and small-town charm, Fairfield continues to attract residents, visitors, and businesses to the area. As a result of this growth, 87.3 percent of the 20.85-square-mile total area has been developed, leaving minimal remaining land for new development. **Fairfield Forward provides a critical, strategic framework for future growth and community resources** to ensure a high quality of life can be sustained for years to come.

HOW WAS THIS PLAN CREATED?

This plan was developed from August 2018 to September 2019 with input from City staff, elected officials, community members, a steering committee, and four small area plan committees that met regularly to guide the development of the citywide and small area plans. Comments from community members are highlighted throughout this report in the "What We Heard" boxes like the one shown.

Popular comments received during the planning process include:

- 1 Continue to provide excellent public services
- 2 More sidewalks, trails and paths are needed for better overall connectivity throughout the City
- 3 Better property maintenance is needed
- 4 Design guidelines are welcomed in certain areas to provide for a more visually appealing, cohesive environment
- 5 More sit down dining options
- 6 Limit use on car lots
- 7 Encourage single-family residential development over multi-family residential
- 8 Provide additional recreational opportunities
- 9 Target "blighted" areas for redevelopment, including northern Route 4 and the former Forest Fair Mall
- 10 Safer pedestrian routes to schools

Leaf collection to start November 4

Annual leaf collection is scheduled to begin Monday, Nov. 4, 2019. This program provides free leaf collection services to residents who place leaves in rows or piles between the curb and sidewalk or adjacent to the street in areas not having a curb or sidewalk.

Residents are advised to not place leaves in the street, as gutters and storm sewers can become blocked and cause localized flooding during moderate to heavy rainfall. Leaves should be raked between the curb and sidewalk, or in areas without curb, adjacent to the street.

Residents are also advised to not park in front of or near the piles between the hours of 7 a.m. and 8 p.m. as the trucks/equipment cannot reach those piles and they will be left until the next scheduled collection week. Grass clippings, sticks, limbs or brush should not be placed in with the leaves. These items can clog and damage equipment and injure workers.

Due to the large volume of leaves, crews may run behind schedule from time to time, but residents should have leaves raked to the curbside by the above dates. Residents who have a small amount of leaves, or who do not wish to participate in the program, may find it more convenient to bag their leaves and place them curbside for pick-up on the regular trash collection day.

School Resource Officers support student success

Starting with this school year, the amount of resource officers provided by the Fairfield Police Department in the City's schools increased from two to four.

The School Resource Officers (SROs) Program began in 2000. The operation and development of it is based on input from school administrators, teachers and faculty.

The officers promote school safety by building a positive climate in which everyone feels safe and students are supported to succeed. They are positive role models and encourage good moral standards, judgment, discretion, respect for other students and a sincere concern for the school community. They also provide information on community resources to students and parents.

Officers establish trusting relationships and effective communication with students and their parents as well as school staff.

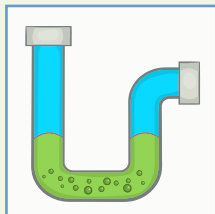
The City has historically paid for these officer positions, but with the expansion to four, the school district will pay half the cost. The total cost to be split between the City and the school district is estimated to be \$504,000 annually.

Don't add to the preparation and clean up by clogging the pipes. Here are some tips and tricks:

- Do not wash grease and oils down the drains. They solidify in pipes and cause blockages
- Minimize the amount of food scraps put into the kitchen sink and through the garbage disposal. This material can also collect in pipes and cause blockages.
- Never put bones, coffee grinds, celery or egg shells in the garbage disposal. Pasta is particularly harmful.
- Never flush wipes (even those labeled flushable), paper towels, or sanitary products down toilet.

Coyote in the neighborhood? Here's what to do

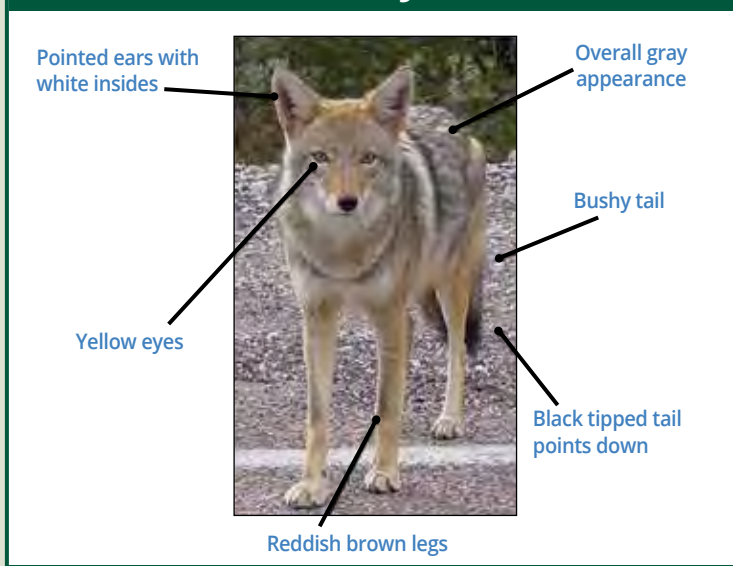
Coyotes are common throughout Ohio's 88 counties and are regularly seen within city limits. We co-exist with them and have for decades without realizing it.

If you spot a coyote on your property, make sure to remove all "attractants" to deter the coyote from returning. This includes removing garbage and pet food before nightfall and cleaning up around the grill. Do not feed coyotes directly.

Coyotes prey primarily on small mammals such as rabbits and rodents. However, interactions with domestic pets do sometimes occur. Keep small dogs and cats inside (especially after nightfall) or leashed when outside. Motion-sensitive lighting tends to be helpful to keep wildlife away from your home.

Occasionally, an inquisitive coyote will stay put and watch you curiously. Make noise. Clap your hands and shout. The coyote will likely move on at this point. If it doesn't, throw objects like rocks at it to scare it away. A coyote that loses its fear of humans could potentially become a threat.

SOUNDS LIKE A PACK OF COYOTES?

LIKELY IT'S ONLY ONE OR TWO

Even though the sounds you hear from coyotes might make you think you are hearing a pack of them, they typically hunt alone or in pairs, not in packs. They use vocalizations as a means to indicate territory and to locate other members of the family unit. Vocalizations include:

• **Woof** • **Growl** • **Huff** • **Bark** • **Yelp** • **Whine**
