Muskopf/Rita Mae Storm Sewer Improvements Update

Construction of the Muskopf / Rita Mae Storm Sewer Improvement has moved along steadily since September. All of the pipe under Rita Mae has been installed at this point and Majors Enterprises, the contractor, is continuing to make progress as the weather allows. Once temperatures rise in the spring, final concrete work and paving will move forward and the project will be complete.

In substantial rainstorms, stormwater rushes down the hillside behind Harbin Park carrying large quantities of mud and debris, overwhelming the storm sewer at Muskopf and Rita Mae. Often, this results in a thick layer of mud on the streets in the area and requires the City to dedicate substantial manpower for cleanup.

The intent of the Muskopf / Rita Mae Storm Sewer Improvements is to capture the muddy stormwater at an improved inlet structure and pipe it directly to the detention basin at the end of Rita Mae where it can be cleaned up more effectively and efficiently. Concentrating the frequent cleanup to one location will also minimize the drain on City resources, particularly during flooding events.

The new storm pipe runs down the middle of Rita Mae Drive, west of Muskopf Road. The new inlet, built to capture large debris, will replace the current design and work in the detention basin will make some minor changes to ensure easier cleanup.

In total, this improvement is expected to cost \$721,000 and will finalize in the spring.

Brush collection starts in April

Curbside brush collection begins the first full week in April and runs through October. Pickups will be scheduled (starting the first Monday of each month) as follows:

- The first week of each month - areas west of Pleasant Avenue (U.S. 127)
- The second week of each month - areas between Pleasant Avenue and Winton Road
- The third week of each month - areas east of Winton Road

During the winter months, the Operation Drop Box Program is available to residents wishing to dispose of brush. The Public Works Department will leave a box at a resident's home for a certain period of time for residents to place brush in the box for the City to dispose.

Scheduling of drop boxes may be done by email, phone, or in person through the City's Public Works Department at 8870 North Gilmore Road between the hours of 8 a.m. and 5 p.m.

Dickey's Barbecue Pit Opens

Fairfield residents have a new barbecue option with the opening of Dickey's Barbecue Pit on Route 4. Located in the shopping center with Rapid Fire Pizza and adjacent to Caruso's Ristorante, Dickey's is a fast-casual restaurant chain with more than 400 locations across the country.

Dickey's is known for beef brisket, pork ribs, chicken, and other meats. The Fairfield location is operated by a regional franchisee and offers both dine-in and drive-thru options for customers.



Panera Bread to Open Later In 2021

Exterior construction has wrapped up on the new 4,500 square foot Panera Bread location on Route 4, opposite of Production Drive. Final interior work to open the restaurant has been delayed due to COVID-19, but the restaurant is still anticipated to open later this year.

The new Panera Bread will include a drive-through and other features of the Panera 2.0 store model, which Panera introduced in 2014. Panera franchisee Covelli Enterprises will operate the location. Based in Northeast Ohio, Covelli Enterprises is the largest franchisee of Panera Bread locations with more than 300 stores in five states and Canada.

An additional outlot next door to the new Panera is being actively marketed for development as well.

New TIF Districts Established

Fairfield City Council has approved the creation of two Tax Increment Financing (TIF) districts in targeted commercial and industrial areas of the City. The goal of these TIF districts is to foster new development and redevelopment by creating a funding source for public improvements such as upgrading roadways, extending utilities, or demolishing blighted structures.

TIF districts have been used as a community and economic development tool throughout Ohio and across the country. Long-term, these TIF districts will generate revenue that will be strategically leveraged to eliminate blight, attract new development, and grow jobs in the Town Center, Route 4 corridor, and industrial areas of the city.

The two districts include:

- South Town Center:** This district encompasses the southern two quadrants of downtown (south of Nilles Road) and continues down Pleasant Avenue to John Gray Road. A TIF district was previously established north of Nilles Road.
- Northeast Area:** This district encompasses commercial properties on each side of Route 4 between Springdale and Hamilton, as well as much of the industrial area of the City to the north and east of Route 4.

The creation of the TIF districts alone will not raise taxes on any included property now or in the future. The district generates funding by redirecting a portion of property taxes received on any increased value of property over the 30-year term of the district. These TIF districts were established in a manner so that funding to Fairfield City Schools and Butler Tech will not be impacted. No residential properties are included within the districts.

Prior to creating these TIF districts, the City mailed notification letters to more than 600 property owners within the then proposed districts. A public meeting was held in late October to provide an overview, answer questions, and receive public feedback in advance of consideration by City Council.

Chamber Annual Event Goes Virtual

In response to the COVID-19 pandemic, the Fairfield Chamber of Commerce delayed the annual dinner event and created a video series for social media. Entitled "Fairfield Thriving Together," the series spotlights how Fairfield citizens and businesses, with assistance of the Chamber, are pulling together to keep our community both healthy and economically vibrant in the context of COVID-19.


City & County Provide Financial Support to Local Small Businesses

Since the start of the COVID-19 pandemic, the City has attempted to be creative in supporting the business community. This has included efforts to ensure businesses are aware of State and Federal financial resources and providing some flexibility with zoning codes and requirements.

Thanks to Fairfield City Council and the Butler County Commissioners, the City was also able to provide nearly \$600,000 in direct financial relief to small businesses in the community. Butler County and Fairfield both used a portion of Federal CARES Act funding to support the program and provide grants ranging from \$5,000 to \$10,000 to businesses with 25 or less full-time equivalent employees.

An important partner to the program was the Fairfield Chamber of Commerce. The Chamber led efforts to ensure that eligible businesses were aware of the program and assisted business owners through the application process.

The impacts of the program are highlighted below:



COVID UPDATE

Twenty-nine members of the Fairfield Fire Department received their first dose of the COVID-19 vaccine manufactured by Moderna on December 28, 2020 and received their second dose on February 2, 2021. The vaccinations were coordinated through a partnership with the Butler County General Health District (BCGHD). Through an agreement with the BCGHD, the Fairfield Fire Department became a Closed Point of Dispensing of the vaccine. As part of Phase 1A, emergency medical personnel were prioritized for vaccine distribution. Personnel that perform emergency medical duties, such as EMTs and Paramedics, and are part of the Phase 1A group designated by the State of Ohio. Dr. Steven Yamaguchi, the Fire Department's medical director administered both sets of vaccinations to Fire Department personnel. Fortunately, no one that received the first dose of the vaccination has reported any major side effects, and most only complained of a sore arm at the injection site. Since the onset of the pandemic, Fire Department personnel have transported nearly 300 COVID-19 positive patients. The vaccine will help with keeping our paramedics and EMTs safe and on the job.

We recommend the public go to the Ohio Department of Health's website at www.vaccine.coronavirus.ohio.gov to look for providers in their area that may have the vaccine. Priority is for residents with severe underlying medical conditions and those that fall into older age categories.

Educational Signage Installed in City's Wellfield

In late December, four educational signs were installed along the bike/hike path that runs through the City's wellfield – just north of the Waterworks Baseball Park on Groh Lane. The Hamilton to New Baltimore Groundwater Consortium coordinated the signage project, with generous financial support provided by Duke Energy. The signs include information about the local aquifer system and how to prevent water pollution. Each sign also contains a QR Code that can be scanned with a smart phone and links the phone to the Consortium's website for more information.


The mission of the Consortium is to protect public health by preserving high-quality water resources through a cooperative source water protection program. The mission is realized through a variety of tasks, including assessments, management, monitoring, emergency response and education. The wellfield signage project is an example of how the Consortium educates the general public on the importance of groundwater protection. Fairfield - a charter member of the Consortium since 1967 - plays an especially large part in helping protect the aquifer due to the City's physical proximity atop the aquifer system.





Community Engagement

The City of Fairfield hosted a charity event at the Public Works Department on Saturday, January 16 from 10 am to 2 pm. Over 65 volunteers from the Fairfield Community Foundation, the City of Fairfield, and others worked with the talented team from Sleep in Heavenly Peace to build 60 beds for children in need. The Public Works facility made a great venue for volunteers to have plenty of room for this worthwhile cause.



Finance Department Recognized

The Government Finance Officers Association of the United States and Canada (GFOA) has awarded the Certificate of Achievement for Excellence in Financial Reporting to the City of Fairfield for its comprehensive annual financial report for the fiscal year ended December 31, 2019. The report has been judged by an impartial panel to meet the high standards of the program, which includes demonstrating a constructive "spirit of full disclosure" to clearly communicate its financial story and motivate potential users and user groups to read the report. The Certificate of Achievement is the highest form of recognition in the area of governmental accounting and financial reporting, and its attainment represents a significant accomplishment by a government and its management.




Living Legacy Tree Program at Creekside Park
