Fairfield's Annual Leaf Collection Schedule

Fairfield's annual leaf collection is scheduled to begin Monday, November 1, 2021. This program provides free leaf collection services to residents who place leaves in rows or piles between the curb and sidewalk or adjacent to the street in areas not having curb and sidewalk.

Residents are advised not to place leaves in the street, as gutters and storm sewers can become blocked and cause localized flooding during moderate to heavy rainfall. Please help make the collection program run as smoothly as possible by raking your leaves between the curb and sidewalk, or in areas without curb, adjacent to the street.

Also, please do not park in front of or near the piles between the hours of 7:00 a.m. and 8:00 p.m. as the trucks/equipment cannot reach them, those piles will be left until the next scheduled collection week. For the safety of our workers and the equipment, we also ask that residents not place grass clippings, sticks, or brush in with the leaves.

Crews will collect leaves on the following proposed schedule:


Depending on weather and volume of leaves, crews may run a little bit behind schedule from time to time, but please have leaves raked to the curbside by the posted dates.

Notifications to residents will be provided with residents' utility bills, through social media, and on the City Website.

Residents who have a small amount of leaves, or who do not wish to participate in the program, may find it more convenient to bag their leaves and place them curbside for pick-up on the regular trash collection day.

Nelson's Popcorn Land Debuts

If you want to try every flavor at Nelson's Popcorn Land, you'll need to visit several times. Recently opened at 5094 Pleasant Avenue in Reigert Square, the store carries more than 50 different varieties of flavored popcorn. Drinks, pretzels, and other snacks are also offered.

Ribbon Cutting at MSCE

Fairfield officials recently joined the Cloverhook Center for the Blind & Visually Impaired to cut the ribbon on its new Multistate Center East (MSCE) facility on Port Union Road. MSCE works on a contractual basis with the Library of Congress and the National Library Service to provide interlibrary book and magazine loan services in an adaptive format for the blind and physically handicapped. The Fairfield facility, which relocated from Woodlawn, provides materials to all U.S. states east of the Mississippi River.

Mercy Health Expanding on Patterson

If you have driven down Patterson Drive lately, you may have noticed construction in the former Planet Fitness building. Construction is underway on Mercy Health's new Fairfield Internal Medicine location.

Currently located at 5150 Sandy Lane, this new location will allow Fairfield Internal Medicine to expand to nine physicians. The building will receive a \$2.2 million renovation to create 30 exam rooms and lab space that will be open to both the community and patients of the practice.

"Mercy Health has a long history in the City of Fairfield, and we saw the immediate opportunity to grow one of our most popular practices in the Patterson Drive location," said Mercy Health Physicians Chief Operating Officer Courtney Seitz.



"In addition to easing access to important primary care services by adding more providers to the practice, patients and the community can also take advantage of lab services located conveniently under one roof."

Hilco Vision Commits to Fairfield

An industry-leading global eyewear and eye care solutions company has committed to place a major new manufacturing and distribution facility in Fairfield. Massachusetts-based Hilco Vision announced in July that the company will lease Building I at Fairfield Commerce Park on Seward Road. The company had considered multiple sites across the region and other states for the new facility. The company plans to create 150 new jobs in the next year and ramp up to 200 employees at the facility by 2024. Hilco produces eyewear solutions, including cases, lens cloths, lens wipes, and kits, for retail consumers as well as products and tools for corporate clients. The company will manufacture lens care and personal branding solution products in Fairfield.

The City is excited to welcome a respected and growing manufacturing company as the first tenant of Fairfield Commerce Park. When complete, the 137-acre Class A industrial park is anticipated to include 1.5 million square feet of industrial space. Building II is complete and partially leased. Building III, the largest planned building at more than 600,000 square feet, is also under construction at the rear of the park.



Removing Dead Trees

For many years, Fairfield has taken pride in being designated as a Tree City USA community. The past few years have been difficult for trees in the area however. Between the Brood X cicadas, invasive insects like the emerald ash borer and spider mites, and the ever-worsening effects of climate change, many trees in our community are struggling to survive.

City crews remove dead or dying trees on public property such as parks and public buildings. On private property and within the right of way, it is the responsibility of property owners to have dead or dying trees removed (per City ordinances). Public Works occasionally prunes street trees as a service to our residents, but ownership responsibility of street trees remains with property owners.

Dead or dying trees are eyesores for individual properties and for the neighborhood at large. They can attract other insects and vermin, create negative curb appeal, and ultimately harm property values.

Dead trees also present serious safety concerns. Once a tree has died, it can quickly begin deteriorating and losing stability. When this occurs, it can pose a safety risk to property owners, neighbors, and visitors and a serious threat of damage to nearby property. Both of these situations create significant liability concerns for property owners. Additionally, if the cause of tree death is invasive insects or tree disease, then leaving the dead tree on the property may promote the spread of tree insects or diseases to nearby healthy trees.

In some cases, trees that are struggling may be able to be saved with timely assistance from a landscaper or arborist. Waiting too long, however, will likely result in the need to remove it. The cost to remove a large dead tree can be high. Property owners are advised to plan ahead and prepare for this cost.



Updating the Planning & Zoning Code



The City is beginning the process to update its Planning and Zoning Code. The existing code was adopted in the early 1980s and has undergone numerous amendments over the years

since to address emerging zoning issues as well as deficiencies in the code. A goal from the 2019 Fairfield Forward Comprehensive Plan recommended a complete overhaul of the existing code in order to carry out the goals and policies outlined in the plan.

The Planning and Zoning Code is the City's primary tool to guide development throughout the community. It sets standards as to how land can be used, such as placement of a building on a lot, how tall a building can be, and the type of signage that can be used to advertise a business. It also addresses the design of new subdivisions in terms of roadway layout, lot size and drainage.

The update will make the code more user friendly by updating terminology, improving the overall organization, and incorporating tables and graphics.

The City received proposals from several qualified consulting firms before selecting McBride Dale Clarion, a regional firm specializing in code revisions, to lead the update project. The community will be informed and involved throughout the process, which is expected to take 18 months. Anyone can follow along with the update by visiting www.FairfieldZoning.com.

Resor Road / Winton Road Water Main Replacement Project Completed


In August, the City's Public Utilities Department and its contractor JW Brennan Excavating LLC completed a critical water system improvement project on Resor Road and Winton Road. In total, the project resulted in the replacement of over 5,700 feet of old and failing cast iron piping on Resor



Road between Augusta and Sigmon Way, and on Winton Road between Resor and Mack. The project significantly improves water service reliability and fire flows to utility customers in the area, and also improves the City's ability to move water from the west side to the east side of the City (from Hunter Tank in Harbin Park to Mack Tank near Mercy Hospital). Total project cost was approximately \$950,000.

Following utility project completion, Public Works' contractors repaved the entire area. While the Winton/Mack intersection was

not repaved, it will be improved in the near future in accordance with the City's proactive street maintenance program.



In the past six years the City's Water Division has replaced over 5.5 miles of failing 1950's era cast iron water main. The City strategically replaces old water mains based on the calculated likelihood and consequence of asset failure. In total there are over 188 miles of public water mains in Fairfield.
