Finance News – Your Success is our Business

The City of Fairfield's Income Tax Department would like to remind taxpayers to file your tax return on time, by the due date of April 18, 2022. If you cannot pay the entire amount due at filing time, you may qualify for a monthly payment plan agreement. Payment plans extend the time to pay up to 12 months.

The monthly payment plan agreement, entered into with the taxpayer and tax office, gives a taxpayer more time to pay and stops further interest and penalties from accruing. These options enable taxpayers to make payments online or by phone using a debit or a credit card. Taxpayers can also utilize the drop box located at the entrance of the Annex building, send a check or money order made out to "City of Fairfield Income Tax", or make a cash payment in person at the tax counter in the Annex building. The Income Tax Department is located at 701 Wessel Drive in the Municipal Building Annex.

Do you qualify for a payment plan?

- You have filed all required yearly tax returns.
- You do not currently have a payment plan in place.
- You have not had a payment plan cancelled for non-payment.
- You have paid your estimated taxes.

Home Improvement Expo is March 12



Main Street Coin celebrated 20 years in business this September. The business began on Main Street in Hamilton and relocated to 4942 Dixie Highway in 2002. In addition to coins, the shop specializes in all types of rare metals. Congrats to owner Joseph Barrett and his staff!



Koch Foods Expanding Again

Already one of the city's largest employers, Koch Foods has announced another expansion project at its campus on Port Union Road. The company has purchased an additional 18 acres directly north of the site and accessible from Commerce Center Drive. On the new acreage, the company plans to construct a second manufacturing plant exceeding 400,000 square feet.

The new building will initially accommodate two food production lines and 400 new jobs. Up to three additional lines could also be installed in the future. The initial phase represents private investment of more than \$220 million. The city plans to expand water and sewer capacity to serve Koch and the surrounding industrial growth.

Koch Foods began operations in Fairfield in 1999 and currently employs



approximately 1,200 people. The company has expanded several times, the largest of which was completed in 2016. Koch is a vertically integrated poultry products manufacturer specializing in chicken and other proteins.

Fairfield Sees Population Growth

According to newly-released 2020 U.S. Census results, the City of Fairfield welcomed nearly 2,400 new residents over the last decade. The population of the city is now 44,907, which represents a 5.6% increase since the 2010 U.S. Census.



Special thanks to our residents who took the time to complete the census online, by phone, or in-person. A complete count ensures that the City will receive its share of federal funds over the next decade.

Hints to Help During Snow Removal

During snow removal operations, the City of Fairfield requires your assistance in helping our crews be more efficient in their duties.

1. Please move all vehicles from the street if possible to ensure our drivers may clear the snow from the roads more efficiently.
2. When using a snow blower or shoveling your driveway, do not put the snow into the street.
3. The snow has to go off to the side of the road or into the right-of-way area (that includes driveway aprons). To save yourself some work, if you can, wait until the driver has finished plowing your street. Then shovel your apron.
NOTE: our goal is to clear the street from curb to curb.
4. Do not try to pass a snowplow or salt truck. It is recommended that you stay 100 feet back from salt trucks.
5. Every truck has blind spots, so don't assume the driver can see you. Please do not pull up behind a salt truck.
6. The City will not take requests for specific streets to be plowed. The City is sectioned into areas with the streets broken down by priority.



Police Department News

Each year, on average, Fairfield law enforcement officers respond to nearly 500 traffic complaints, conduct over 1,300 traffic enforcement details, and make more than 7,000 traffic stops.



The Police Department focuses the bulk of its traffic enforcement activities on responding to complaints from citizens and enforcing violations that often lead to crashes, such as:

- impaired driving
- speeding
- running red lights and stop signs
- failing to yield
- improper lane changes
- following too closely


The Department utilizes data from two sources - quarterly traffic crash analysis reports and speed studies - to identify potential traffic concerns and determine where and when to concentrate enforcement efforts.

Our quarterly traffic crash analysis reports review crashes by location, type, contributing factor, day of week and time of day. These reports allow the Department to deploy officers and resources efficiently throughout the City. The Police Department responds to approximately 1700 traffic crashes annually.

Like the traffic crash analysis, speed studies provide data for specific locations and are often the first step in proactively addressing speeding complaints. Fairfield's Public Works Department conducts the studies, which consist of attaching a portable device to a speed limit sign to gather information on the number of cars using a particular area, their speeds, direction and time of day. The Public Works Department also deploys these devices on a rotating basis in problem areas and in response to citizen complaints to attempt to educate drivers and deter speeding by displaying vehicle speeds. To the right is a photograph of the device.

Citizens occasionally ask the City to place speed humps on public roads to address speeding. Although speed humps slow cars, they present a hazard for snowplows and emergency vehicles and are difficult to maintain. As such, the City deploys them sparingly.
