Fairfield designated a Purple Heart City

At the October 13 City Council Meeting, Retired Marine Corps Colonel and Councilmember Terry Senger read a proclamation honoring the men and women who were wounded or died in military service to our country. The Purple Heart is combat specific and is the oldest military medal. Look for flags honoring Purple Heart recipients on flagpoles around the City.

Purple Heart City



Honoring America's Wounded Veterans



WHEREAS, Chartered by an Act of Congress in 1958 for combat wounded veterans, the Military Order of the Purple Heart is composed of military men and women who received the Purple Heart Medal, which is awarded in the name of the President of the United States to members of the Armed Forces wounded in combat with an enemy force and posthumously to the next of kin of members of the Armed Forces killed in combat; and

WHEREAS, the "Military Order of the Purple Heart" organization was formed in 1932 for the protection and mutual interest of all who have received the combat decoration, is composed exclusively of Purple Heart recipients, and is the only congressionally chartered veterans service organization comprised strictly of "combat" veterans; and

WHEREAS, the Order of the Purple Heart for Military Merit, established by General George Washington during the Revolutionary War at Newburgh, New York, on August 7, 1782, is the oldest military decoration in the world in present use; and

WHEREAS, in recognition of this date and the estimated 1.7 million veterans since World War I who have been awarded this medal of honor, the Mayor and the City Council of the City of Fairfield desire to be among the first of many to become a "Purple Heart City" and to declare October 13, 2020 as "Purple Heart Day" as a tribute to the service and sacrifices of all veterans, and especially the valor of the extraordinary men and women who have earned the Purple Heart.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Steve Miller, Mayor of the City of Fairfield, Ohio, do hereby proclaim October 13, 2020 as:

"PURPLE HEART DAY"

FURTHERMORE, on behalf of the City Council and citizens of the City of Fairfield, I proudly accept the official designation of:

"PURPLE HEART CITY"

and confirm the City's commitment to honor those who serve and have served so faithfully in defense of our freedoms as Americans and gratefully acknowledge their sacrifice, bravery, and unwavering commitment as patriots.


Fairfield Connects

City Council recently adopted the Fairfield Connects Master Connectivity Plan as the guiding document for developing stronger linkages between neighborhoods, schools, Village Green, parks, regional trail connections, and employers. The idea for Fairfield Connects was borne out of the Fairfield Forward Comprehensive Plan in 2019 when residents overwhelmingly expressed their desire for a more complete network of sidewalks and off-road multi-use paths.

Recommendations for the report were derived from over 1,000 resident surveys, feedback from an open house at the Community Arts Center, and insight provided by a Fairfield resident steering committee. The plan calls for 19 major connectivity routes that will be prioritized over several decades as funding becomes available.

What's a day off look like?



- Slow down.
- Beware of snowplow blind spots.
- Stay 100 feet behind snowplows.
- Park off street if possible.
- Do not shovel or blow snow into street.
- If possible, wait to shovel driveway aprons until the street has been cleared.

Furniture Disposal

Residents who wish to dispose of large unneeded furniture that cannot be sold or donated may do so at no additional cost by contacting Rumpke at least 48 hours before to schedule removal on their normally scheduled trash day. Large items should be placed alongside solid waste and recycling containers no earlier than the night before pickup.

Mattresses, box springs, and cloth furniture (e.g. upholstered, vinyl, leather) pieces must be completely wrapped in plastic before Rumpke drivers will dispose of them. The purpose of the plastic wrap is to limit the spread of bed bugs. Wood or plastic items do not need to be wrapped in plastic.

City ordinances prohibit placing junk furniture outside for more than 24-hours before it is to be removed.

Spams, Scams and Phishing: Protect Yourself!

Email and text are the primary ways scammers and hackers compromise a computer or network. Fairfield's IT Division has compiled some tips for keeping you safe:

- Too good to be true? If something sounds too good to be true, it probably is.
- Contact the company directly by their general phone number as listed from an internet search.
- Check the sender's email address.
- Poor grammar or spelling and missing logos can be an easy way to spot scam emails.
- Scammers use images as the body of emails to bypass word scanning systems.
- Never give bank account details, SSN, or password information to anyone through text or email.
- Any file type that supports macros such as documents, spreadsheets, ZIP files, etc. is suspicious. They should be scanned before opening. Delete all password protected attachments.
- Double check links by hovering with the mouse cursor before clicking.
- Don't trust emails from anyone who is asking for gift cards..
- Watch for illegitimate links that are close to correct (e.g., cdc.com instead of cdc.gov).


Living Legacy Tree Program at Creekside Park


